The Mentally Retarded Child May Be Happiest in a School

I just received a letter from a lovely woman who reminds me that retarded children are often much happier in a special school than when they are kept at home. At home when they try to play with other children of their own age they are unhappy because they just cannot compete on equal terms. The retarded child of a dear friend of mine, when he was 10 or 12, used to be so unhappy because his brothers and their friends wouldn't let him play baseball with them. His muscles did not coordinate in such a way that he could play well any game in which agility and speed were needed. Finally, his father sent him to a school for retarded boys, and there the lad was happy; at last he was among fellows who would play with him and with whom he could compete. Also, no one was expecting of him in the schoolroom and on the playground more than he could possibly accomplish.

Many parents hate to send a retarded child away to school, partly because they worry about what the neighbors will say. Those who know psychoanalytic

pattern may say they rejected him. Actually, I have always maintained that in this world it is foolish to worry much about what the neighbors will say; we should all do what we think is best and right.

Only Few Know Seriousness

Only the parents and the brothers and sisters of a retarded child know how serious a problem he (or she) is in the home. Sometimes the handicapped child is taking so much of his mother's time that she cannot properly take care of the bright and normal children, and I think this is wrong. Also, sometimes the presence of a retarded child in the home causes the lives of the normal children to be disrupted in one way or another. In the family of dear friends of mine, the older boy—a retarded but lovable lad—was kept at home until the parents found that the younger brother was constantly fighting with other boys who were tormenting and making fun of his loved older brother. Then the parents put the lad in a special school where he was contented and happy.

A few young women patients of mine have told me that the reason they never married was that every time a beau came to the house, he saw the unpleasant behavior of a retarded brother (or sister) and shied away.

Everyone who is puzzled about this problem ought to read Mrs. Pearl Buck's book about her own little daughter who never grew up. One reason Mrs. Buck saw to it that the child was well established in a good school was that if anything were to happen to her—the mother—the child would not be left stranded in an unsympathetic world.

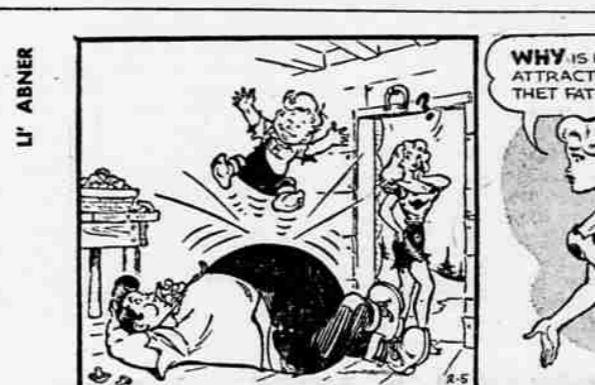
