

'Do Pass' Label Attached To Six Highway Bills

Salem—UP—Six bills recommended by the State Highway commission, including an \$8 million bond issue, were reported out of the House Highways committee yesterday with a "do pass" recommendation.

The committee, headed by Rep. Thomas McClellan, Neotoma Democrat, voted for further consideration on four bills including the bill amending the state highway law.

Bond Issue Necessary
State Highway Engineer W. C. Williams told the committee that the \$8 million bond issue was necessary to insure full participation in the federal interstate highway program.

The bill amending the state's throughway act to bring it into conformity with federal standards and enabling the highway commission to carry county and city roads over and under throughways without permission was postponed.

Portland City Attorney Alex Brown read an analysis of the bill by traffic consultant Fred Fowler to the effect that there were certain conflicts and technicalities that should be ironed out before it was approved.

Placing of Stop Signs
Other bills okayed would enable the highway department to use discretion in placing stop signs at intersections with major highways; increase the highway commission emergency fund from \$1 million to \$1.5 million; restrict the left turn after stopping at a light red to turning only from a one-way street into another one-way street; simplify law enforcement on overweight and oversized vehicles; and enable heavy construction vehicles to operate on highways without individual trip permits.

Forms Necessary for Sewer Connection
Phoenix—Phoenix residents have been asked by the Coast Construction company, contractors installing the city's new sewer system, not to connect to the system at property lines until after flow tests have been made by the company and the system is accepted by the city.

Official notice will be given when hookups can be made, according to Mayor Vince Claffin. It was also requested that lines be stopped at least five feet from these connection points, leaving the ditch open for inspection.

Application blanks for hookups can be acquired at the Phoenix city hall, beginning Feb. 15 the city hall will be open five afternoons a week, including Saturday afternoon.

Before ditches are covered, residents should request an inspection of the line from sewer inspector Warren Haggard. A fee of \$2.50 per inspection will be charged, Claffin said.

Highway Billboard Control Proposed

Salem—UP—Sen. Rudie Wilhelm Jr. of Portland, joined by other members of the Senate and House, has introduced a measure to control highway billboards along the new federal interstate highways in Oregon, U. S. 99 and 30.

The bill would drastically curtail highway billboards on the two major routes but would allow roadside services to have two signs in each direction within the two-mile limit of such roadside service. The bill also would not restrict erections of signs within a business district or within 300 feet of any place of business which advertises the business.

Wilhelm said he was aware of and commended the action of Sen. Richard L. Neuberger of Oregon to limit signs on these federal highways and hoped that the Oregon Legislature would take action to preserve the scenic beauty along the state's new freeways.

The Oregon roadside council has approved the bill, Wilhelm said.

Eisenhower Says Study Not Made Of Oil Price Hikes

Asked if he considers recent oil price hikes as unjustified from a standpoint of their possible effect on inflation, the President said he had not seen a study of oil prices or discussed them in any detail.

Asked about comparative military strengths of this country and Russia, the President said the United States has developed weapons to the point where it is as strong as it ever has been in time of peace.

Discounts War Danger
He conceded that the United States has not reached the stage it would like on long range missiles. But he said short range missile performance is improved.

Asked about the possibility of a Soviet attack, he almost exploded. Such likelihood grows less every year, he said, adding that any military adventure today is just another way of committing suicide.

1. He said the United States should ship oil to Europe to the fullest capacity of available transportation facilities. He held out the possibility that if this does not take place the federal government may have to step into the situation.

National Guard Issue
2. He renewed his support of the four-point administration civil rights program before Congress. He said there is nothing in it inimical to the rights of any person and that he regards the legislation as very decent and needed.

3. He again voiced strong support for the mandatory six-month basic training ordered for National Guard enlistees beginning April 1. In his opinion, he said, the 11 weeks' alternative plan proposed by the National Guard association would not answer the defense needs of the nation.

4. He said that Vice President Richard M. Nixon is being kept constantly abreast of developments within and out of the government so that in the event that—as the President put it—the grim reaper removes Mr. Eisenhower from the scene, Nixon could take over without any delay.

Truman Receives Scalp Laceration

Kansas City, Mo.—UP—Former President Truman received a two-inch scalp laceration Tuesday when he slipped and fell on an icy sidewalk at his home in Independence, Mo.

Mr. Truman did not receive medical attention until some five hours later at his office in downtown Kansas City.

The wound across the back of Mr. Truman's head was "clear to the bone," his doctor said. The doctor said he took six stitches in Mr. Truman's scalp.

Mr. Truman brushed the incident off. "At a quarter to seven I was working around the house when I slipped on a walk and bumped my head," he said. "It didn't amount to anything." A freezing drizzle had put a film of ice on the walk.

"He was bleeding like everything when he went to the office," the doctor said. "I stitched him up as he sat in his chair, and then he got up and went to lunch."

The doctor said Mr. Truman was in "fine" general health.

Three Labor Unions Told To Clean House

Miami Beach—UP—Three big labor unions have been ordered to clean house within 90 days or get out of the AFL-CIO. The federation's Executive Council Tuesday night accused the unions, with memberships totaling 170,000, of being "dominated, controlled and substantially influenced by corrupt influences."

The council told the three unions they must rid themselves of officials involved in welfare fund abuses in order to remain in the AFL-CIO. The unions denied the accusations and criticized the council action.

The unions are the Laundry Workers International, the Distillery, Rectifying and Wine Workers International, and the Allied Industrial Workers.

Dorothy Dandridge Accuses Magazine

Hollywood—UP—Actress-singer Dorothy Dandridge accused Hep magazine in a \$2 million libel damage suit today of referring to her as having "1,000 lovers" and linking her with men she has never met.

Miss Dandridge filed suit Tuesday against the magazine's publishers and distributors, charging false and malicious assertions were made about her in last month's issue of Hep.

She referred to a story titled "Dorothy Dandridge—Her 1,000 Lovers," which, she said, imputed a laxity of moral character and habits to her and subjected her to contempt, ridicule, humiliation and embarrassment.

Named as defendants were Good Publishing Co.; Mutual Circulating Sales; Adelle Jackson, executive director of the magazine; D. M. Lee, managing editor; Jerry Townsend, writer of the article; and George Levitan, Rebecca Levitan and Annie Carr, Good stockholders.

Inspection of Mine Blast Area Continues

Bishop, Va.—UP—Seventeen state and federal mine inspectors returned to the Pocahontas Fuel Company's vast soft coal mine today to seek the cause of an explosion which killed 37 miners two days ago.

William A. Fullerton, special assistant to the president of Pocahontas, said the inspection team found no clues in a nine-hour survey of Tuesday. The inspectors will open a hearing today, he said.

The inspection team also planned to interview some of the 140 men who escaped to safety through a railroad tunnel when the blast wrecked the elevator shaft where the victims were working, he said.

Shell To Build Long Crude Oil Pipe Line

Houston, Tex.—UP—Shell Oil Co. today announced formation of a new company to build a \$50 million 600-mile crude oil pipe line from the Four Corners area of Utah to Los Angeles.

The new firm will be known as the Four-Corners Pipe Line Co.

The new pipe line, to have an initial capacity of 30,000 barrels of crude daily, will be built and operated by the Shell Pipe Line Corp., as agents for the new company. It is expected that crude shipment out of the Four Corners area can be started by the end of 1957.

Purpose of the new venture, according to the backers, is to provide another source of crude oil for an expanding Pacific Coast economy and to stimulate development of the Four Corners producing area.
