## Malocclusion Causes Many Problems for Youngsters

(Editor's note: This is the last in a series of articles concerning dental health. The series is being published in cooperation with the Southern Oregon Dental Society and the American Dental Association in observance of National Children's Dental Health Week, Feb. 3-9).

One of the worst results of so-called crooked teeth is the impact of ridicule upon a child who may be taunted by his playmates or the psychological stress borne by a teen-ager who is miserably self-conscious about appearance.

In addition to emotional and social factors, teeth in improper alignment—dentists call it malocclusion—prevent other problems.

**Facial Deformities**  
 Malocclusion may cause facial deformities. It may contribute to speech defects. It may interfere with proper eating habits, causing malnutrition. The teeth may be especially susceptible to dental decay because their position makes it difficult to clean them properly. And malocclusion may lead to diseases of the gums later in life.

Dentists agree generally on the major causes of irregular teeth.

There is evidence that heredity may play a part. Another cause is persistent thumb-sucking beyond the age of about five, and other habits that put abnormal pressure on the teeth and jaws.

Still another cause is premature loss of first teeth or too long retention of first teeth.

Studies indicate that about one-fifth of U.S. children have serious malocclusion. The condition develops most commonly during the time when a child is losing his first teeth and when his second teeth are appearing.

## Sensitive Receivers To Track Satellites

New York—(UP)—A group of radio receivers so sensitive they can "hear invisible stars" is being produced to track the Earth satellite which will be launched by the United States during the International Geophysical Year, Bendix Aviation Corp. announced today.

The company said the radio, as "Minitrack," was designed and built by the Naval Research Laboratory. A string of 12 installations along the American continent will pick up the signals from the satellite and permit its course and orbit to be plotted.

The Bendix announcement said the satellite's transmitter will put out a signal 1,000,000th as strong as that of a standard radio station, or about as strong as the power of a 100-watt light bulb, from a distance of some 200 to 1,500 miles above the Earth. Picking this up should be duck soup for Minitrack, it said. The receiver can hear the "noise" of stars so far away they cannot be seen.

## Wonder Girl Said To Be in Good Condition

Grants Pass—(UP)—Doctors here today said a two-year-old child who wandered away from her rural home at Wonder, Ore., Tuesday afternoon and was not found until about noon yesterday, apparently survived the ordeal with little ill effect.

Little Dorothy Brown was found lying on a pile of fir boughs in a densely wooded area about 2½ miles from her home as a party of about 400 searchers combed the region.

Hospital reports said the child suffered frost bite to her arms and legs but apparently came through with no other ill effects. Temperatures in the area had dropped to about 20 degrees during the night the girl was lost in the woods.

Sounds of a child whimpering led two searchers, the Rev. Roland Stewart and Ralph Rodrick, both of Grants Pass, to the girl's location.

The development of badly positioned teeth may often be prevented by periodic dental care. For example, if a first tooth is lost too soon, the dentist can insert a space maintainer, if necessary, so there will be space for the permanent tooth to come in at the right place.

If special corrective treatment is needed, the dentist may refer the patient to an orthodontist.

**Means at Hand**  
 To sum up, the means are at hand to cut down drastically on the enormous rate at which dental disorders are developing. The most practical approach to the problem is through the child. The youngster who starts out with proper dental habits has an excellent chance to reach adulthood with sound teeth.

Ideally, the toothbrush should be used after every meal and snack.

Consumption of sweets should be reduced, especially between meals.

**Fluoride Content**  
 The fluoride content of the public drinking water should be adjusted or, in rural areas, a fluoride solution applied to the teeth of children.

There should be periodic visits to the dentist, beginning when the child is about three.

With proper safeguards, there is practically no reason why teeth should not last a lifetime as they were intended to do.

## Insurance Policies May Be Reinstated, VA Officer Says

Many veterans who held National Service Life Insurance policies have expressed confusion by recent changes in insurance laws, S. T. Brannock, officer in charge, VA office, 33 North Riverside ave., said today.

Veterans who let their term policies lapse are losing the benefit because they believe policies cannot be reinstated.

This is not the case, for lapsed GI term insurance policies may be reinstated any time before the end of the term period, Brannock said.

The VA has found that many veterans also believe that, because they have let several premiums go by on their five-year level term policies, they have lost the benefit.

Brannock explained that if the five-year term has not expired, that the insurance may be reinstated upon application and the payment of two monthly premiums.


A medical examination is required if the policies have been lapsed for more than three months, but none is required if the policies have been lapsed less than three months, and the insured signs a statement declaring he is in as good health as he was on the date of lapse, Brannock said.

Any VA office will assist veterans in reinstating GI term insurance, Brannock said.

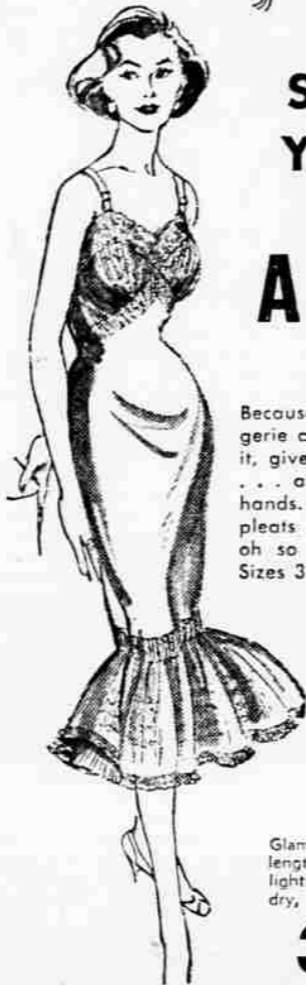

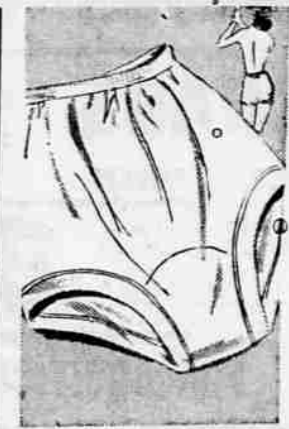
