

Ducks Rest Midway in PCC Season

University of Oregon, Eugene — Oregon's Webfoots, idle this week end in the Pacific Coast conference championship race, returned to practice Wednesday after a brief two-day vacation ordered by Coach Steve Belko prior to the last half of the league schedule.

The Webfoots get back into action next Tuesday at Corvallis in a non-conference game against Oregon State and then meet the strong Washington Huskies in a two-game series at McArthur Court on Feb. 15 and 16. UCLA then comes to the Duck home court on Feb. 22 and 23 and then the Webfoots travel to Southern California on March 1 and 2 before meeting Oregon State at Corvallis on March 8 and here on March 9 for the season finale.

Coach Don Kirsch's undefeated freshman team has the only scheduled basketball action this week, traveling to Monmouth Friday to meet the Oregon college junior varsity. The Ducks, paced by Chuck Rank and Jerry Anderson of Jefferson, Dale Jones of South Salem, Stu Robertson of St. Francis of Eugene and Doug Lindstrom of Eugene, have swept through their first eight games without a loss and now have seven contests left on the 1937 schedule.

Better Outside Shooting

Belko said he was still trying for better outside shooting to ease the defensive pressure against his two aces, Charlie Franklin and Hal Duffy. "We have to hit a little better outside," Belko said, "to keep our opponents from jamming up the key and dominating the rebounds."

Franklin and Duffy continue to lead almost every department in the Webfoot statistics with Franklin leading in scoring and field goal shooting and Duffy topping the free throwing and rebounding. The squad statistics for 16 games follows:

Oregon State Scraps California Hoopmen

UCLA and California, who have looked down from the top of the Pacific Coast conference basketball standings all season, will have to look up tonight to protect their undefeated records.

The Bruins will gaze up at 6-foot, 10-inch Bruno Boin and 6-7 Doug Smart of the University of Washington, while the Bears will be confronted by 6-8 Gary Goble and 6-7 Dave Gambee of Oregon State. And the tall boys will have the advantage of their home courts.

If UCLA and Cal can get past the northern giants tonight, they still can't relax; the same opponents will be on hand tomorrow.

In other PCC weekend series, Washington State plays at Stanford and Idaho visits Southern California.

Only one game is scheduled tonight in the California Basketball association, but that pits two of the three teams currently tied for first place as St. Mary's meets the University of San Francisco. Tomorrow St. Mary's plays San Jose State and Loyola meets Pepperdine.

The UCLA-Washington series will have a big effect on the championship hopes of both teams. The defending champion Bruins have won 32 straight conference games, including six this season. Washington leads the conference in victories with seven and has lost only one.

California, with six straight wins, faces an Oregon State team that has lost six out of eight, but you can't judge the Beavers by the records. OSC was beaten twice by both UCLA and Washington while California hasn't met either team yet.

And while the Bears have one of the leading defensive teams in the country, the Beavers have two of the coast's leading scorers in Goble and Gambee.

The Washington State-Stanford series will involve fourth place, with the Indians attempting to hold that spot against the sharp-shooting of the Cougars. Larry Beck, leading scorer in the PCC.

OSC will go against Idaho in an effort to take over the Vandals' seventh spot in the standings, while cellar-dwelling Oregon is idle.

The PCC standings: California 6-0, UCLA 6-0, Washington 7-1, Stanford 4-4, WSC 3-5, OSC 2-6.

Carolinan Passes Up Point Chance

Basketball's hero today was jump-shooting Grady Wallace, who had a chance to pass both Chet (The Jet) Forte and Will (The Stilt) Chamberlain in the national scoring derby and passed it up.

The six-foot, five-inch South Carolina star needed 39 points going into Thursday night's game against Wake Forest to pass Columbia's Forte and only 34 to pass runner-up Chamberlain of Kansas. He settled for 26 as South Carolina upset Wake Forest, 55-49, to end the Deacons' seven-game winning streak.

Wallace could have done it. At least, he had a good chance, for he already had notched 24 points with 10 minutes left in the game.

Slow-Down Game

But South Carolina was out in front in the game at Columbia, S.C., and elected to play a slow-down game to preserve its lead. Giving up his chance for the national acclaim that the No. 1 spot would have meant, Wallace took only one more shot in the game and that just three seconds before the final buzzer, tipping in a basket to make his final total for the night 26 points.

Wallace, a 21-year-old junior from Mare Creek, Ky., who was the nation's leading junior college scorer last year with Peirville, Ky., Junior College, thus saw his scoring average drop from 29.6 points per game to 29.4. He stays in third place behind Forte's 30.1 and Chamberlain's 29.8.

The loss was only the second in the last 17 games for Wake Forest, the nation's 15-ranked team which hadn't been beaten since bowing to national leader North Carolina. The Deacons, led by Jim Gilley's 17 points, tallied only five baskets during the second half.

OSC, Oregon Vie On Mat, in Pool

Corvallis — Two of Oregon State's highly-successful and undefeated winter sports teams—wrestling and swimming—place their unblemished records on the line Saturday before top-flight opposition at Dad's week end on the campus.

Coach Dale Thomas' Beaver wrestlers, victors in six straight matches, face their stiffest competition yet Saturday at 1:30 p.m. at Gill coliseum when they meet the undefeated Oregon Ducks. A preliminary mat event at 11 a.m. sends the OSC Rooks against the Oregon Frosh, also in the Coliseum.

OSC's powerful swimming team, coached by Art Koski, takes out the strong Arden Hills AAU team of Sacramento at 2 p.m. in the men's gym pool. The Beavers have four straight wins under their belts, most notable of which was a stunning 52-34 defeat of the perennial-champion Washington Huskies last week end at Seattle.

Wrestling supremacy in the northwest and possibly on the coast will be partially decided Saturday. The Beavers won the Pacific Coast team crown in 1955 and 1956, while Oregon was runner-up at the coast meet last winter. Thomas meets the Saturday match a toss-up.
