State Police Report Three Vehicle Accidents on Friday

No serious injuries were reported in three separate car accidents in Jackson county Friday, state police said.

Simmons, 60, Camp White, was treated for a cut jaw at the Camp White infirmary and his passenger, Josephine Jones, 82, of 2122 Crater Lake highway, was taken home by bystanders after she received a leg injury in an accident on the Camp White "drag strip", police said. The accident occurred at 7 p.m.

Vehicles Sideswipe
 According to police, Simmons said he was driving the car north on the strip when he apparently suffered a heart attack and went off the road at the

end of the strip. No other vehicle was involved in the accident.

Police said a car operated by Vernon Caldwell, 38, of 131 Alder st., Central Point, and a lumber truck operated by Orval Paris Kelly, 44, of 1629 Thomas rd., sideswiped each other near the center line on the Central Point-Jacksonville rd, about one-half mile from Jacksonville. Caldwell's car was traveling north and Kelly's truck was traveling south when the accident occurred, officers said. No injuries were reported and no citations were issued. 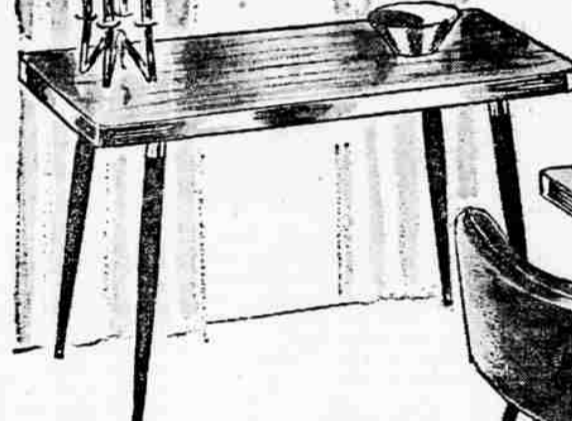
