Lumber Market Continues Slow, Sluggish in State

The lumber market in Oregon continued slow and sluggish last week, according to two market news letters.

"Few signs of optimism appear," according to Random Lengths, Eugene market report, which said the week was marked with "sluggish demand and continued low prices."

Crow's Lumber Market news service, Portland, reported the drop in prices which has continued for many months was slowed because of recent cold weather which slowed production.

Bad Weather
But bad weather in consuming areas, particularly California, also kept overall demand slow, it stated.

There was fair demand for some items. Ponderosa pine commons picked up strength, the two reports stated, but this was offset by weakness in other grades and associated species.

Random Lengths said that some mills are withholding a large portion of their production hoping for price improvement, but that even so, inventories are accumulating. It said that mills catering to mixed car shipments of green and dried lumber report a steady but low volume of retail yard buying, mostly to fill gaps in inventories resulting in highly specialized orders.

Death of Girl Ruled Suicide in Astoria

Astoria—(U.P.)—Coroner Raymond Luce Saturday announced a verdict of suicide in the case of a 12-year-old girl who was found fatally wounded here Wednesday night.

The victim was identified as Delphia Carol Cartwright. Her stepfather and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Jeff D. Clement, had moved here only Wednesday after he was transferred to the Navy base at Tongue Point. He is chief gunner mate.

Luce said the stepfather and mother came home about 10:30 p.m. Wednesday and heard a shot. They found the doors locked and gained entrance by breaking a window. The girl had been shot through the head. She died Thursday morning in a local hospital.

Radio System Due At Crater Lake

Work crews of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, Portland, will begin installation this Monday of an FM two-way radio system for use at Crater Lake National park, Tom Williams, park superintendent, has announced.

A contract was awarded recently to the PT&T on bids submitted last September which were based on a lease rate for each type radio equipment.

The crews will install the base station as well as the antenna for the base station, to be located in the basement of the park lodge. A remote control system will be installed at park headquarters which will operate the station.

The base station will be at the Crater Lake rim. Mobile units will be in 16 vehicles, including ranger patrol cars and snow plows.

Williams said the radio system is for routine business, fire protection, administrative and emergency purposes.

He added part of the installation should be done this winter.
