New York — (U.P.)—Stocks plunged through their 1956 resistance levels today and set new lows since Nov. 2, 1955, on moderately increased volume. Railroad shares, the poorest performers, set a new low since Jan. 20, 1955. Utilities had one of their widest losses for five months but held above the year's lows.

Support developed before closing time in the industrial and rail divisions while utilities hit new depths for the day.

Trading swelled to a new high since Jan. 21 but still wasn't what Wall Street would describe as climatic selling.

Losses extended to more than three points in a long list of issues, and a great many set new lows for more than 13 months. All sections of the market participated in the drop.
