

Black Tornado Defeats Comet Hoop Aggregation by 49-32

Medford High had a tough scrap on its hands for a full half against the Crater Comets on Saturday night but the Central Pointers were able to collect nearly a point in the third stanza while the Black Tornado rolled up 15.

That turn of events gave a 24-point spread to the Tornado and settled the issue as Medford defeated the Comets 49 to 32 at Central Point in a Southern Oregon conference basketball ruckus. It was Medford's fourth win of the season over Crater and the ninth loop victory for the Black Tornado which took a full lead in the standings over Klamath Falls.

Ashtland further bolstered its third place position in the league by tipping Grants Pass 37 to 35 on Saturday for a week end sweep over the Cavenem.

Defense Tighter—Except in the first quarter Saturday the Tornado did not match the torrid Friday shooting. Medfordites were both cooler and less able to get the good shots they did against the Comet defense on the opening night of the series and Saturday's first quarter found Crater's rugged offense better able to match the offensive pace of the Tornado.

Crater took an early 4 to 2 edge over Medford but Dick Puhl's goal off a fast break and his free shot on Don Goyette's personal infraction made it 5 to 4 for Medford, which kept on top the rest of the evening. First quarter ended 15 to 11.

In the second stanza Goyette's long jumper was the only goal for the Comets for five minutes. In the meantime for Medford Dick McLaughlin put in two gifters and a long push from the field. Dick Puhl got a fielder's block and a foul toss and Perkins a driver goal from the side for a 24 to 13 edge.

Medford, itself, got just a field goal in the last half of the second quarter while Fred Herrmann of Crater swished two free throws and slipped in under the hoop for a field goal. Halftime count was 26 to 17.

Crater's scoring drought enabled the Tornado to stretch its command to 41 to 17 in the third quarter. Actually the Comets went pointless more than 9½ minutes, Craig Cochran ending the scoreless streak with a hook shot 30 seconds into the final quarter. The Comets didn't even

get a try at the free line in the third stanza.

Crews of non-starters played throughout the final quarter with the Comets taking that end of the tangle 15 to 6. Crater got three field goals and Medford one in the closing session and put in nine gifters while Medfordites flipped in flour.

The Tornado hit 15 field goals in 47 tries for 31.9 compared to the 44.6 average the night before. Crater, which hit 143 on Friday, had 204 on Saturday night.

Randy Campbell of Crater suffered a deep bruise over a kidney in the second quarter when Dick Coppel of Medford collided with him. It was thought that no serious injury resulted. However, Campbell may miss this week end's series with Ashtland.

Herrmann topped rebounding with 10 Crater retrieves. Neil Plumley and Coppel got seven each for Medford.

Delany Wins Miler Duel

New York (U.P.)—Olympic 1,500 meter champion Ron Delany of Ireland won the first in a pair of four-minute miler duels in the Millrose games Saturday and world board track records were shattered by burly Milt Campbell in the 60-year high hurdles and Arnie Sowell of Pittsburgh in the 880-yard run.

Delany, a student at Villanova who ran the mile in 3:59 at Compton, Calif., last June and never has lost an indoor mile, scored by 10 yards over another "four-minute miler"—Lazo Tabori, the self-exiled Hungarian.

Delany's time was 4:06.7 for his second straight victory in the Wanamaker mile before a crowd of 16,000 at Madison Square garden.

Campbell, Olympic death ion champion, twice ran the hurdles in seven seconds flat, bettering the old mark of 7.1 set by Harrison Dillard in 1948 and equalled by "Old Bones" in 1955.

Sowell's half-mile in 1:50.3 clipped two-tenths of a second off the old record set by the late John Borican of New York in 1942.
