### Study of State Reorganization Proposed in Act

Salem—(U.P.)—An interim committee to study the reorganization of state government and the possible elimination or consolidation of various state boards and commissions was proposed in a resolution introduced by 31 legislators in the Oregon House today.

The resolution appropriates \$15,000 for the study. Recommendations of the interim committee would be given to the governor who has suggested a revamping of many state boards and commissions.

### Interstate Compact

A bill sponsored by Rep. Glen Stadler and Sen. Donald Husband, Eugene, would authorize the governor to enter into an interstate compact on juveniles providing reciprocity in return and care of runaway children or escapees of probation and correctional institutions.

The director of parole and probation would administer the \$32,300 program.

Another bill introduced in the House by Rep. Vernon Cook, Gresham, would provide that public officials file a financial statement with the secretary of state 15 days after taking office and an income report each year thereafter. The report would be

confidential except to the governor.

**Would Forfeit Offices**  
Public officers or employees who refused to waive immunity or to testify for a referral to the people would forfeit their offices under terms of a constitutional amendment proposed by Rep. Cook.

Fourteen legislators signed a bill that would permit peace officers to arrest persons suspected of shoplifting without a warrant and would enable detention of such persons a reasonable length of time while recovery of the goods was attempted.

### Commission Gets Ruling From Official

Portland—(U.P.)—The Oregon State Fish Commission said today that it had received a ruling from the attorney general which backs up the commission's stand against poisoning Ten Mile lakes in southwestern Oregon.

A spokesman said the effect of the ruling would be to forestall, at least temporarily, the State Game Commission's announced plan for poisoning the lakes.

The game commission had planned to go ahead with its plans despite opposition from the Fish Commission which contended that sufficient study had not gone into the project.

The attorney general's ruling backed up the fish commission in its contention that the game commission cannot go ahead with the poisoning without the consent of the fish commission.

The game commission had planned to poison the lake to rid it of bullhead catfish and yellow perch. The fish commission's opposition, was based on the idea that the sizeable silver salmon runs in the lakes might be greatly damaged in the poisoning process.

### Idaho Student Pleads Innocent To Two Charges

Moscow, Ida.—(U.P.)—Paul D. Matovich, University of Idaho freshman charged with first degree murder and arson, yesterday pleaded innocent to both charges.

Matovich was charged with murder for the deaths of three men who were killed in the Gault Hall fire Oct. 19 and with arson for a fire at Chrisman Hall Oct. 13.

### Sams Valley Man, Son Rescued from River

Grants Pass—James R. Shope, 40, of Sams Valley, and his 12-year-old son, Tommy, were rescued from the Rogue river Sunday afternoon after their fishing boat hit a snag and overturned near the old Ferry hole.

They were rescued after their cries were heard by two Grants Pass men, John Inkrote and Joe Kirhofer. The two men were in Inkrote's boat downstream at the time.

A companion in Shope's boat made it safely to shore after it had overturned. Inkrote and Kirhofer held their boat steady in the current until the man and boy drifted down to them.

Both had swallowed considerable water and were shaking with cold when pulled in but suffered no other ill effects. The boy wore a life jacket.

Their companion, Sam Morris, Central Point, clung to the snag and later made his way unassisted to shore.



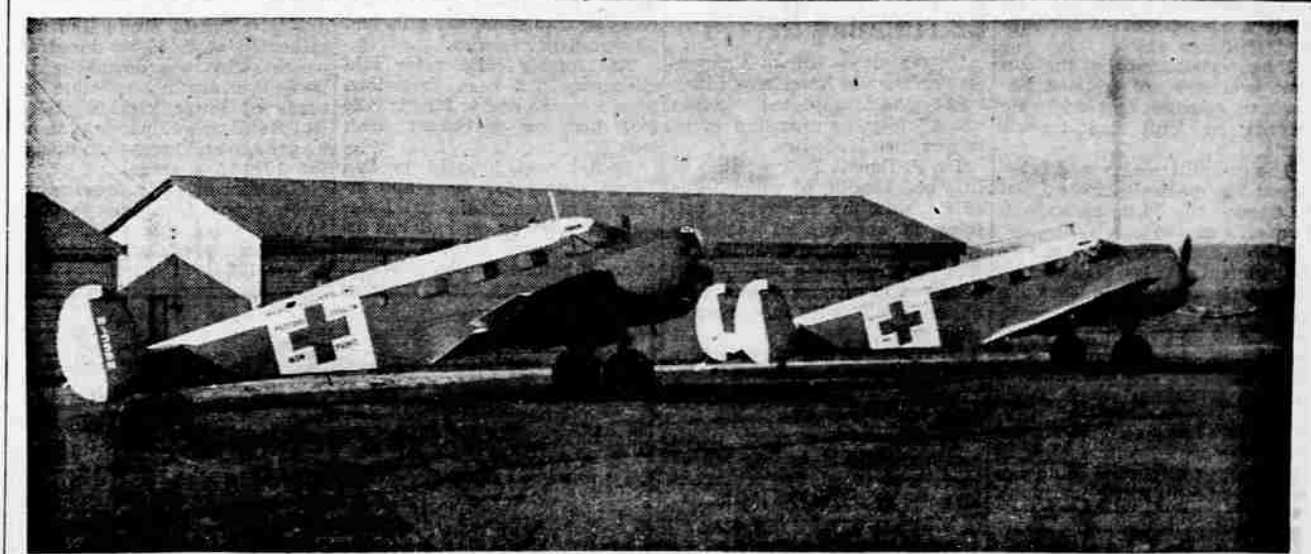
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
