Stock Rally Fizzles When Profits Taken

New York (U.P.)—A further rally in stocks fizzled late today when the traders who bought for a quick turn elected to take profit.

At the day's highs the list showed gains in all major sections. Industrial shares at their top had with the aid of Wednesday's sharp rally restored 85 per cent of the Monday-Tuesday losses and rails 73 per cent.

The market started to decline when the Treasury asked Congress to permit an increase in the interest rate on savings bonds from 3 per cent to 3 1/4 per cent.

Tillamook Cheese Sweepstakes Winner

Corvallis (U.P.)—Tillamook regained its position as the cheddar cheese capital of Oregon last night when Donley Lommen, a Tillamook cheese maker, was awarded the sweepstakes trophy of the Oregon Dairy Industries.

Last year Tillamook lost its traditional dominance in the cheese field when John Haedinger of Portland won the award.

In the butter division of the annual competition in the dairy industry, sweepstakes trophy went to Curtis Jensen of Eugene who tied with C. S. Korsmo of Clatskanie and Francis Morrill of Portland.

Elected president of the Oregon Dairy Industries association at its 46th annual conference here last night was Joe Yoder of Eugene. He succeeds John Tolleshaug of Rainier.

Washington Gets Astoria Bridge Bill

Olympia (U.P.)—Bills authorizing Washington to join with Oregon in a feasibility study of the proposed Megler-Astoria bridge at the mouth of the Columbia were introduced in both houses of the Legislature today.

The bills would appropriate \$100,000 as Washington's share of a study to determine construction, location and the financial feasibility of the Highway 101 link-up.

The total cost of such a study was estimated at \$200,000, to be paid equally by both states.

Last Rites Set for Pioneer Medical Man

Portland (U.P.)—Funeral services will be held here tomorrow for Dr. William J. Gilstrap, who, at 86, was the second oldest member of the Oregon State Medical Society. He died Tuesday at La Grande.

Dr. Gilstrap was active in the founding of the Multnomah Medical Service Bureau, one of the forerunners of Oregon Physicians Service, a pre-paid medical insurance agency. He began his medical practice at Sheridan, Ore., and moved to Portland in 1914.

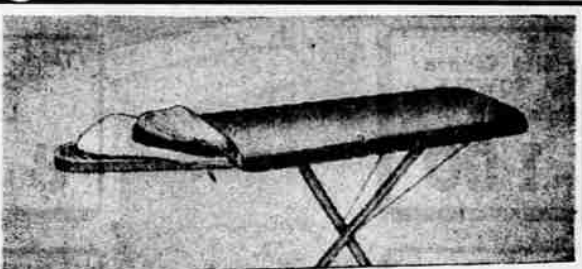
