Budget Cutters Get Off To Slow Start

Washington—(U.P.)—The House Appropriations Committee got off to a slow start today in its announced effort to cut heavily into President Eisenhower's record \$71.8 billion peacetime budget.

Approving the first regular appropriation bill of the current Congress, the committee trimmed \$80,364,000 off administration requests for \$3,985,291,000 for the Treasury, Post Office and U.S. Tax Court in the 12 months starting July 1. The cuts amounted to about 2 per cent.

Committee members have been clamoring for substantial slashes in the budget. They explained somewhat sorrowfully that first money bill did not cut the agencies involved simply aren't subject to much cutting.

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Letter Threatening Ike's Life Traced

Washington—(U.P.)—The story of how King Harry I of Harrisonia made a threat on the life of President Eisenhower unfolded today.

Secret Service chief U. E. Baughman told the tale in newly-released testimony before a House appropriations subcommittee.

Baughman said a threatening letter signed by "King Harry I of Harrisonia," was one of 18,468 letters to the President examined by his staff last year.

This letter told the President that if he objected to the formation of a new state he would "have to reason with a 22 Winchester," Baughman said.

Agents investigated. They had little trouble tracking down the sender whose name actually was something like Harry Harrison (Baughman said he changed the name somewhat in his testimony).

Agents found that Harry, 12 years old, and his playmates had sent in breakfast cereal boxtops which entitled them each to a square inch of land in Alaska.

Harry and his friends decided to band together, form their own country and secede from the union.

Baughman said the boy got off with a "severe lecture" from his mother.

"He did not realize the seriousness of his threat against the President and when the possible consequences were explained to him, he repented. I surrender. I am now a citizen again," Baughman said.

'Wintersef' Slated As SOC Production

Ashland—"Wintersef" play by Maxwell Anderson, will be given in Churchill hall auditorium at Southern Oregon college Friday and Saturday, March 1 and 2, at 8:15 p.m. Angus Bowmer is directing the play.

Bowmer said the play is a violent one dealing with the bitterness and cynicism of the depression era and is rather earthy in its language. Bowmer added that it is a controversial play and is not suitable for children.

Bowmer said the staff has obtained an enlargement of an actual photograph of the Brooklyn tenement district, which will serve as a backdrop for one of the two scenes in the play. Otto Wilda is working out the technicalities of the setting.

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Stocks Soar Higher On Humphrey's Word

New York—(U.P.)—Stocks advanced sharply today when Secretary of the Treasury George M. Humphrey told Congress he sees no signs of an economic recession.

The upturn, embracing all sections of the market, lifted value of all listed shares by more than \$1 billion and with the Wednesday's spurt all but wiped out losses suffered in three days of decline.

Individual issues of the oil, steel, shipbuilding, metal, and automobile groups ran up two to more than four points.
