## Local Presbyterian Men To Attend Area Meeting

Dr. Louis Hadley Evans, former pastor of Hollywood's First Presbyterian church, will be the keynote speaker at the fourth Western Area meeting of the National Council of Presbyterian Men, to be held in San Francisco on Feb. 22 through Feb. 24. The Council is the laymen's organization of the Presbyterian Board of National Missions.

More than 20 members of the Presbyterian Men's club of the First Presbyterian church, Medford, will leave Wednesday, Feb. 23, to attend the conference.

Presbyterian men from nine Western states will participate in the assembly, which will feature many speakers. Among them will be David W. Proffitt, present Moderator of the Presbyterian General Assembly, and Dr. Eugene Carson, stated clerk of the Presbyterian church and president of the National Council of Churches in the U.S.A.

Adults will be led by Mrs. Grover Corum and Mrs. Marshall Sweet at 7:30 p.m. They will speak on the distinctive elements of different Protestant denominations.

Westminster Fellowship for high school students will be led by Carol Dyke of the Outreach commission. The discussion will center on missionary work around the world.

## Clause Added to Constitution by Congregation

At a recent meeting of the Congregational church of Medford voted to add to the constitution a clause establishing the racial inclusiveness of the church.

There had been nothing in the constitution before suggesting that segregation was to be practiced, but since the matter is being much discussed it was thought that the position of the church clear and unequivocal.

The sentence added to the constitution reads: "No person shall be denied the privilege of membership in this church by reason of race or color, but all shall be welcome to share in its worship, become members of the church fellowship and participate in all of its organizations and activities."

This proposal was brought to the congregation originally by an adult discussion class who arrived at the recommendation after considerable discussion of race relations. It was considered by the church council before being brought to the whole congregation for action.

## Methodist Women Gave \$27,000,000

According to Statistician Albert C. Hoover of the Methodist church, Chicago, the national Woman's Society of Christian Service of that denomination now number 1,790,441 which is noted as a gain of about 23,000 members over the figures of a year ago. This makes the Methodist WSCS the largest denominational group of church women in America, and probably the largest in the world.

The society is organized into 31,061 local societies in as many churches spread across the United States. Its national president is Mrs. J. Fount Tillman of Lewisburg, Tenn. During the past year, the societies paid a total of \$17,225,283 for work and services within their own parishes (such as furnishings for the parsonage, help for community need) and in addition \$10,152,759 for missionary and other services "outside the local parish."

## Salem Ministers Fill Legislative Chaplain Posts

Salem ministers rotate as legislative chaplains for the state Senate and state House of Representatives, according to information received from the speaker of the House and president of the Senate.

Instead of having one regularly scheduled chaplain for each legislative body, the Salem Ministerial association schedules the ministers from the Salem area who have volunteered to open the day's session with prayer.

In this way it is seldom that the same minister is scheduled to appear more than once during the entire legislative session.

Before the session begins, the chief clerks of the Senate and House of Representatives contact the secretary of the Salem Ministerial association and a month's schedule of volunteer ministers is set up. A new schedule is made each following month.

The schedule is occasionally interrupted by guest ministers who are invited by members of the state legislature.

Balcomb, will feature a book review of "The Living of These Days," by Harry Emerson Fosdick. The reviews are scheduled for 7:30 p.m. in Meeker Memorial Chapel.

The Rev. George A. Trobough, First Methodist church, lead the devotions.

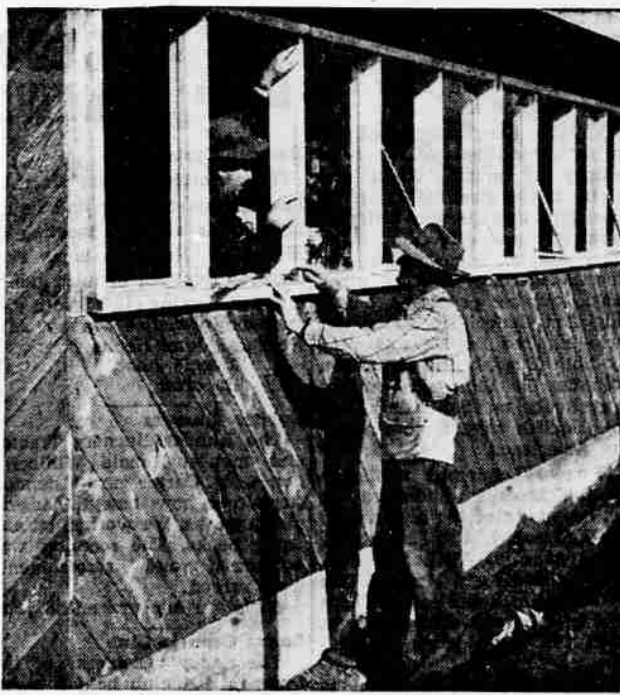
## Friends Youth Plans Sunday Evening Service
