

Klamath Grapplers Winners In District 7 Tournament

Klamath Union High school won the District 7 wrestling tournament here Friday and Saturday, took seven championships and four runner-up spots and placed those 11 men in the state tournament at Corvallis next week end in nine weight divisions.

A total of 184 points were piled up by the strong Pelican delegation on the basis of first, second, third and fourth placings, pins and advancement points.

Grants Pass was second with 153, Illinois Valley third with 73 and Medford fourth with 53. Crater collected 36 tallies and Glendale 35. The tournament was held at the Medford high gym.

The Cavemen of Grants Pass placed eight men in the state, four each as district champs and as runners-up. Illinois Valley had two titlists crowned and will also send three district runners-up to Corvallis.

Runners-Up
Gordon Oswley, Medford, and Don Hubbard, Crater, were the only men from their respective schools to qualify for state. Oswley made it in the 130 pound class by defeating Ron Phair, Klamath Falls, in consolation finals of the double elimination tournament. Hubbard dived his schoolmate, Jim Goldenpenny in the match for second place.

Lyle McFarland, Klamath, won the 98 pound class, defeating Art Desaulniers, Illinois Valley, in yesterday afternoon's finals. Desaulniers for second place then beat Ray Johnson, Klamath Falls, who had tripped Bob LaCombe, Grants Pass, in consolation semi-finals.

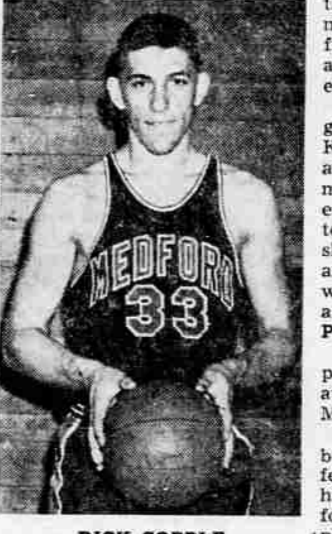
Louis Still In Tax Tiff

Chicago — (U.P.) — Former heavyweight boxing champ Joe Louis and the U. S. Revenue Dept. appeared ready Saturday for another round in their non-title bout for Joe's money.

The tax office wants \$1,250,000 which it claims Louis owes in back taxes and penalties. Louis says he simply does not, and never will, have that kind of money.

Latest development in the struggle was an offer made by the Joe Louis fund Friday to give the federal government all but \$25,000 of Louis' earnings for the next five years in settlement of the debt. According to the agreement, Louis would be allowed to keep \$5,000 a year to support his two children.

Federal authorities have declined to comment on the proposed settlement but say Louis will get a "square deal" in the compromise eventually agreed upon.
