Family Here From Holland

Eagle Point — Mr. and Mrs. Jim Leeuwenburg and their children, Tina, 16, Wouter, 9, have recently moved here from Holland and are making their home at 417 South B. street in Eagle Point.

Mr. and Mrs. Leeuwenburg were both born in Indonesia, where Leeuwenburg managed a 2000 acre plantation raising tea, coffee and rubber for several years. In 1942, Leeuwenburg was taken prisoner by the Japanese army and Mrs. Leeuwenburg and Tina were taken by Indonesian guerrilla troops and were held prisoners for three years.

The family was united four and a half years later in Palembang, Sumatra. They left for Holland in March of 1948, where they remained until January of this year. Through the Church of the Brethren of Medford it was possible for the family to come to America.

Steven Veheul, also from Holland, now residing with the Reverend Hiser of the Church of the Brethren, was also sponsored by the church.

Leeuwenburg hopes that he may soon become employed and make Eagle Point his permanent home. He remarked that in the few weeks he had been here he had seen more sun than he had seen in Holland during a year.

University Speeds Needed Instructors

Berkeley, Calif. — (U.P.) — A special training program designed to provide badly needed teachers at a faster rate than ever before is beginning its second year of operation at the University of California here. The program enables students who have an A. B. degree to obtain secondary teaching credentials more quickly and for less expense.

The speed-up plan, initiated last year, already has prepared 20 additional teachers for California secondary schools. Training begins with 10 weeks of summer school, followed by a full year of teaching on a provisional secondary credential. A second 10-week summer session at the end of the paid internship year completes the requirements.

The program is similar to that in a number of other states, but it differs from them in that only students who intend to teach in secondary schools will be admitted to the program and that preference will be given those who wish to teach science, mathematics, home economics, physical education for girls, business and other subjects in which there is the greatest shortage.

River Eridanus Visible in South Sky in Early Evening

"Ask for anything you wish and it shall be yours," said Apollo, the sun god to his earthly son, Phaethon, who had just arrived at the palace for a short visit.

"Oh father, let me drive the sun chariot just one day. Please," he added, sensing his parent's dismay.

Apollo, in joy over seeing Phaethon had spoken rashly without due consideration of the boy's one great fault; the desire to always have his own way and a propensity to tease and tease until he got it.

Of all the gods on Mt. Olympus, only Apollo was skillful enough to control the fiery steeds which drew the chariot of the sun across the sky each day. No mortal could ever hope to control these prancing horses whose very breath was a flame of fire.

"My son, you are much too young to undertake so great a responsibility. It is not safe. The steep and dangerous road is beset with terrible monsters. Sometimes it is even difficult for me to manage the horses."

But the boy could not be dissuaded. He would not listen when his father tried to reason with him.

"This is the only thing I want and you said I could have whatever I wished," he pouted.

In sadness and fear for the headstrong lad Apollo finally consented to let him try one trip across the heavens.

"You must be careful and keep to the middle path, my son. If you go too high the heavens may catch on fire; if too low the earth will be scorched."

After a troubled night, Apollo covered Phaethon with a magic oil to prevent the sun from burning him, harnessed the horses to the sparkling chariot and commanded the gates of dawn to be opened.

The boy stepped happily into the blazing, jewel-decked chariot, picked up the reins and whip and released the impatiently waiting animals.

For a short time all went well as the horses pulled the heavy load up the steep grade toward the dome of the heavens. Then realizing that the reins were held in unfamiliar hands, they became unmanageable.

As they shied away from Taurus the Bull, Orion's two dogs began barking loudly. This so frightened the high-spirited steeds they broke into a gallop, and ran even faster when they sighted the Lion.

Clinging desperately to the reins, Phaethon had succeeded, up to this time, in keeping the chariot from overturning. But when he saw the great Scorpion stretching out his tremendous claws and lashing at the chariot

with his poisonous tail, he dropped the reins in terror.

The now driverless horses ran madly down the hills of heaven until they approached the earth so closely it was scorched and great deserts were formed. The waters became so hot that old Neptune, god of the sea, shouted angrily to Jupiter, king of the team!

Jupiter then hurled a thunderbolt at Phaethon who fell headlong from the chariot in the river Eridanus, from which his body was never recovered. In memory of this sad event, Jupiter placed the river in the sky.

Eridanus, The River, is a broken line of 11 rather dim stars that extend from a point just to the right of the bright star Rigel in Orion to a point on the horizon almost directly beneath the brilliant blue-white Rigel. During the middle of February, Eridanus will be almost due south by 7 p.m. but moves to the west as winter progresses.

Orion high in the sky and slightly east of due south at 7 p.m. is easily recognized by the slanted line of three stars evenly spaced and of equal brightness which form the belt. Rigel is the brightest star below the belt in this constellation and forms the left foot of The Mighty Hunter.

As we face Orion, brightest of all constellations, by looking a little to the right or west, we can locate the fainter stars in The River leading from the brilliant Orion to the horizon.

The Dalles — (U.P.) — David Delbert France, 22, of Dufur, Ore., was killed shortly after noon Saturday when the motorcycle he was riding collided headon with a car driven by James Quinton Johnson, 28, a The Dalles area farmer.
