New York—(U.P.)—A big boost in the amount of oil Texas will produce brought a turnabout in the oil shares today after early irregularity in the stock market. The oils set off on a sharp rise and helped lift prices in the oil section ranged to three points. The international oils, Getty, Gulf and Royal Dutch, were the star performers. Other oils rose fractions to a point.

Chrysler, off more than a point from its low, came back substantially. The steels rallied after touching lows that were off fractions to a point. Metals steadied.

Robbery by Fear Guilty Plea Filed

Dallas, Ore. — (U.P.) — William Joseph Vandervoort, 38, pleaded guilty to charges of robbery by fear and kidnaping in Polk county Circuit Court here yesterday.

Earlier, Vandervoort had pled innocent to the charge which stemmed from the robbery last Nov. 20 of the Dallas Safeway store and the kidnaping of the Henry Dalpez family.

Police charged that the Dalpez family was kidnaped in order to force Dalpez to open the store for robbery. Vandervoort was near collapse at his first hearing and was ordered to Oregon State hospital until he was able to appear in his own defense.

Circuit Judge Val D. Sloper said Vandervoort was later transferred to the state tuberculosis hospital when an early case of tuberculosis was found. The judge has ordered a pre-sentence investigation.
