## UCLA Leads 3 Statistics Categories

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — UCLA's basketball team leads in three Pacific Coast Conference team statistical departments although still running second to first-place California in the loop race, it was disclosed today.

Figures released by the PCC Commissioner's office showed that UCLA, which has one conference loss, is tops in total scoring, free throw percentage and rebounding. California, undefeated in PCC play is first in total defense while Stanford leads in field goal shooting and Washington in field goal defense.

UCLA has scored an average of 73.3 points per game, has shot 73.8 per cent with 255 points in 346 attempts from the free throw line and has collected 56.8 per cent of all recoveries in rebounding with 485 rebounds to its opponents' 366.

California has given up but 54.2 points per game. Stanford has achieved its field goal lead with a shooting mark of 42 per cent in 247 goals in 588 attempts. Defensively, Washington has held foes to 32.2 per cent—263 goals in 817 attempts.

In individual play, Larry Beck of Washington State and Doug Smart of Washington continue domination of scoring and all-around play.

Beck, who has averaged 21.2 points per game, holds the lead in total scoring, having made 254 points in 12 conference games on 81 field goals and 92 free throws.

In field goal scoring, Smart has hit 88 times on 161 attempts for a 54.8 percentage mark. Jim Pugh of Southern California, who has appeared in only four games was second in the percentage column with 32.2.

Smart, also topped in rebounds with 170 recoveries out of 1066 chances for a mark of 16 per cent.

Ben Rogers of UCLA topped the free throw shooters with 62 of 70 attempts for an 88.6 percentage mark.

# Court Suspends Vincent Hallinan

San Francisco — (U.P.) — The California Supreme Court ordered Vincent W. Hallinan, once the Independent Progressive Party candidate for President, suspended from the practice of law for three years.

The court decided that Hallinan's 1953 conviction of income tax evasion constituted "moral turpitude."

Hallinan was sentenced to 16 months in prison and fined \$50,000 after he was found guilty of evading \$36,730 in taxes.

Hallinan, 58, said the court's decision was "disappointing," but he added "it really doesn't matter."

"I haven't practiced law any way since I left prison," he said. "I've been working toward an amalgamation of Socialist and other left wing forces and this will give me three more years for this work."

The high court ruling said Hallinan's record "discloses a callous and brazen indifference to the obligations of an attorney, with the object of personal gain."

"Under these circumstances, Hallinan should be removed from the practice of law for a substantial period."

In suspending Hallinan, the Supreme Court was following a recommendation of the Board of Governors of the State Bar.

**Veterans' Bonuses Exempt from Taxes**  
Salem—All state veterans' bonuses are exempt from state and federal income taxation, as are most other benefits paid to ex-servicemen or their survivors, Hub Saalfeld, director of the state department of veterans' affairs, has reported.

Items excluded in computing federal and state tax returns, which are due April 15, include:

All Veterans administration benefits including educational subsistence, compensation and pensions; GI insurance dividends; insurance proceeds paid on death of the insured; state veterans' bonuses; muster-out pay and jobless benefits paid under the Korean GI bill; and social security benefits, workmen's compensation and sickness benefits.

Disability retirement pay is exempt from federal taxation, while Oregon taxes any amount in excess of \$3,000 with this exception. If the VA had at one time been responsible for making the payment, then it is totally exempt, Saalfeld said.

Retirement pay for length of service is taxed both by the federal government and the state, although the federal government now allows a credit for such income, Saalfeld said.

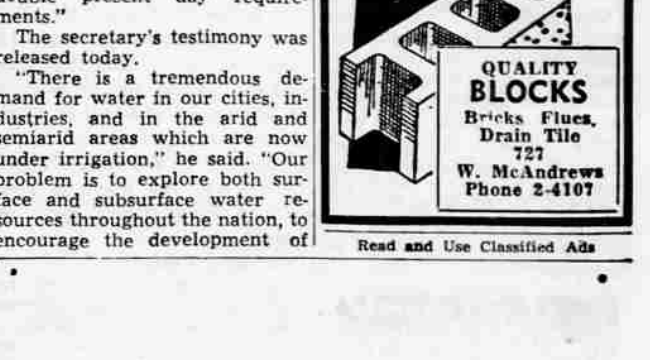
