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Uncle Sam Begins Negotiations With GPO for Short Work Week

Washington — Uncle Sam with a small group of federal employees who are spearheading the drive of government workers generally to cut the work week down to 35 hours without any loss in take-home pay.

The government gives any ground at all, authoritative observers believe it will represent the first break-through against the government's standard five-day, 40-hour work week. The negotiations will be conducted between the photogravers who work at the U.S. Government Printing Office here in the nation's capital, and the head of the GPO, Public Printer Ray Battenberger. This is unusual in itself, for virtually all government salaries are set within limits established by Congress by civil service schedules or wage boards—and in neither case does the employee get to bargain over his working agreement. But Attorney General Herbert Brownell has ruled that the public printer has authority to negotiate with the 6000 workers at the GPO over wages and hours.

The photoengravers are the first to come up for a negotiated agreement on future pay since Brownell's decision, and they are determined to insist on a 35-hour week without any reduction in take-home pay. Most observers think if they win a shorter work week, it will be only a matter of time before this concession to employee desires is extended throughout the federal service.
