

# Strange Disappearance of Oregon Flier Subject of Magazine Story

New York—(U.P.)—Life magazine said yesterday it appeared that missing Columbia University instructor Jesus Maria de Galindez may have been spirited to the Dominican Republic last March by a young American pilot who was slain there in December.

The magazine linked the disappearance of the instructor to the reported murder of Gerald Lester Murphy, 23, Eugene, Ore.

The magazine described its report as "an amazing tale of intrigue, violence and perhaps murder involving the Dominican Republic which is run by the ruthless dictator Rafael Leonidas Trujillo."

Porter Impressed

In Washington, Rep. Charles O. Porter (D-Ore.) said the State Department told him it is investigating the allegations made in the Life story.

"I am impressed with the documentation in Life magazine," Porter said, "and appreciate the efforts they are making in the case. I feel their report has blown the Galindez case wide open and points the finger at the Trujillo regime as being implicated in the disappearances of both Galindez and Murphy."

Galindez was last seen entering a subway after an evening class last March 12. Late that night, the magazine said, Murphy took off from a Long Island airport flying a chartered plane with a passenger he later told friends was an invalid who had been taken from a New York subway and delivered to the airport in an ambulance.

Refueled in Florida

Murphy refueled at Lantana Airport near West Palm Beach, Fla., early March 13 and took off again for Montecristi Airport in the Dominican Republic, the magazine said.

Murphy had been working in Miami as a draftsman and occasional charter pilot. Friends said he had been hard up for money. When he returned from the brief trip, they said, he had plenty of it.

Later, the magazine said, he told Tom Guthrie, the air taxi operator who employed him, that a charter client had fixed him up with a job with a Dominican airline.

On Nov. 17, Murphy wrote his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lester Murphy in Oregon, that his stay in the Dominican Republic had "served its purpose" and that he was returning to the United States.

On Dec. 3, Murphy advertised his car and furniture for sale, the magazine said. The next morning his car was found abandoned on a cliff and on Dec. 13, the State Department notified the Murphys their son was missing.

The magazine said airline pilot Capt. Octavio de la Maza was arrested Dec. 17.

On Jan. 7, the U.S. Embassy at Ciudad Trujillo was informed that de la Maza had hanged himself in his cell, leaving a note to his wife saying he had killed Murphy, the magazine said.

United Nations, N. Y.—(U.P.)—Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld sent a top trouble-shooter yesterday to Egypt where the U.N. salvage fleet clearing the Suez Canal has run into Egyptian delays.

U.N. spokesmen carefully avoided any hint that Katzin was going because Hammarskjöld was concerned about reports that Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser is hampering completion of the clearance until all Israeli troops leave Egypt.

## UN Trouble Shooter Heads for Suez Zone

Los Angeles—(U.P.)—A University of California professor of anatomy has discovered that kidney cells have tiny "legs" and "arms" which swell when they become diseased.

Dr. Daniel Pease discovered the kidney "limbs" by photographing a kidney with an electron microscope.
