'Family Employment' Provisions Unchanged

The Medford office of the social security administration today reminded employers that one provision of the social security law which was not changed by the recent amendments is that pertaining to "family employment."

The provision exempts from coverage a husband or wife in employ of a spouse, a child under 21 in the employ of a parent, or a father or mother in the employ of a child.

According to W. V. Nusbaum, manager, the Medford office notes that the provision is not being complied with in all instances, with the result that some applicants have found that they did not have sufficient covered employment to qualify for benefits.

Ashland Council Sets Election March 12

Ashland — The Ashland city council has set March 12 as date for special elections on leasing property to the Shakespearean Festival association and to the forest service.

The festival association is seeking a lease on land in Lithia park to expand its present facilities. If voters approve the issue, the city would retain control over the property, which would be leased by agreement as the need is shown.

The forest service is seeking a lease on property at Winburn Way and Nutley st., as a location for a proposed office structure.

City officials explained neither lease proposal would involve bond issues or cash outlays on the part of Ashland residents.

Tomatoes Could Benefit Economy of Valley

Economy of the Rogue valley would benefit if more tomato acreage could be obtained, officials of Bagley cannery, Ashland, said Thursday.

It was pointed out that demand for fresh tomatoes here exceeds local production and that most of the tomatoes marketed in this area are shipped in from California. Clarence Holdridge, Talent, cannery field representative, said Bagley cannery pays tomato growers comparable to or above California rates.

He added that the cannery purchases tomatoes from growers on a contract basis and annually requires 50 to 100 acres in the Rogue valley. In 1956 there were 79 acres of tomatoes grown in Jackson county.
