

### Briefs From The Legislature

**Salem**—(U.P.)—The house military affairs committee has scheduled a hearing on a resolution proposing a maximum \$600 bonus for Korean veterans.

**Salem**—(U.P.)—Elimination of 10 officers of district court clerk in Multnomah county and constable in cities of more than 25,000 population was called for in a bill introduced in the Oregon House today.

**Salem**—(U.P.)—Rep. Vernon C. Graham Democrat, introduced a memorial in the House today urging President Eisenhower and the U.S. delegation to the United Nations not to support sanctions against Israel.

**Salem**—(U.P.)—A bill proposed today by Robert L. Elstrom, Salem Republican, would change from five days to 48 hours the time a car could be left on the roadside before being considered abandoned.

### Disease Threatens Student Pranksters

**Ames, Iowa**—(U.P.)—A dysentery-type disease threatened student pranksters who stole about 27 white mice from a laboratory, Iowa State college authorities said today.

Nineteen of the mice, infected with the disease for an experiment, were found dead Thursday in a woman's dormitory.

Dr. John Gowen, head of the college's genetics department, said the other eight probably had been destroyed by the thieves or were dead of natural causes.

The thieves, apparently student pranksters, were threatened with the disease, Gowen said, because it can be transmitted to humans.

### Too Much Osculation At Michigan Dormitory

**Ann Arbor, Mich.**—(U.P.)—Good night kisses have been banned at one University of Michigan women's dormitory because of "numerous complaints of excessive osculation and cuddling."

Members of the Dormitory Council of Stockwell Hall voted 14-4 Thursday night to ban kissing anywhere in the area of the hall. The council said its action was prompted by numerous complaints of "excessive shows of affection."

### Holmes Backs Bill To Transfer Fair

**Salem**—(U.P.)—Robert D. Holmes today endorsed a bill to place the control of the Oregon State Fair back under the State Department of Agriculture.

"I have noted with regret and dismay," Gov. Holmes said, "that many fairs and particularly state fairs have taken on a carnival nature. Yet emphasis should be on agricultural production, on crops and on livestock, on mineral and wood resources and on the products derived from all of them."

He said: "I am not against wholesome fun, and I approve of ferris wheels and merry-go-rounds and whips and other amusement devices, but their amusement value to the people and specifically to those on whom we depend for fodder and food and for the payrolls that derive from our great agricultural industry."

Gov. Holmes said he had received the resignation of Dr. E. B. Stewart of Roseburg, chairman of the State Fair Commission and its representative from the fourth congressional district.

### Segregation Experiment Fails

**Detroit**—(U.P.)—An experiment in segregation at the University of Detroit Thursday fell flat.

Members of the student council thought it would be a good idea to publicize "Brotherhood Week" by forcing students in the engineering, commerce and finance schools to eat in roped-off areas of the cafeteria to demonstrate discrimination.

It also was decided that no blue-eyed blondes could use the drinking fountain and that liberal arts students could go to the head of all the lines.

Came the day of the big experiment. The cafeteria was roped-off and ROTC members in uniform stood about to enforce the regulations.

A mob of indignant students who were being discriminated against stormed the cafeteria, ripped down the ropes and lugged the ROTC boys outside bodily. Then they proceeded to eat their lunch where they wanted to.

### Summer Camp Dates Set By Y Committee

The annual Young Men's Christian association summer camp for boys will be held at the Diamond Lake camp between July 14 and Aug. 10 this year, the YMCA camp committee has decided.

The camp will be held for boys from Medford and Roseburg, committee members said. Young men interested in being camp counselors this year should contact Bob Jones at the Medford YMCA, according to Jim Rowan, committee member.

Rowan said an effort will be made this year to have a summer camp for girls in the Medford area.

### Chessman Given Isolation Term

**San Quentin, Calif.**—(U.P.)—The San Quentin Prison disciplinary board has imposed 20 days in isolation on kidnap-rapist Caryl Chessman for smuggling out a legal document.

The board ordered Chessman to serve the sentence concurrently with the 20 days he is now spending in isolation for smuggling the manuscript of a book and several letters out of death row.

Chessman's latest offense was smuggling a petition for a writ of habeas corpus out of prison and into the mails. It was addressed to Marin County Superior Judge Thomas F. Keating, who received it on Wednesday and rejected it.

Meanwhile, the Internal Revenue Service filed a \$2,174 lien against Chessman in nearby San Rafael for unpaid 1955 taxes. These were presumably on royalties from his books, "Cell 2455, Death Row," and "Trial By Ordeal."

It was the government's second tax lien against Chessman. The first lien was filed in 1955 for more than \$3,000 owed on previous income. That lien has since been paid.

### CRIMINAL ROBOT

**Miami**—(U.P.)—Elly-Bim became history's first robot with a police record Thursday when he was arrested for jay-walking. The six-foot-tall mechanical creation of Stuard Abel, a sophomore electrical engineering student who built the monster in his spare time, was "arrested" as a publicity stunt for the University of Miami's annual engineering exhibit.

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
