Several Proposals Approved by Group

Salem—The local government committee of the Association of Oregon counties approved several legislative proposals affecting county government at a meeting in Salem last week.

Proposed legislation approved by the seven-man committee included House Bill 531, which would authorize creation of county service districts by voter petition to the county court to provide urban services to unincorporated areas within a county.

Also approved were two joint resolutions from the House. One would provide for constitutional amendments to authorize voters to ballot on adoption of county charters to prescribe organizations of county government. The other would permit counties to issue bonds to raise revenues for purposes other than road construction.

The committee also favored a senate bill which would provide a graduated tax scale for a 10-year transitional period for areas annexed to an unincorporated city. During this period, the tax ratio would depend on the additional services provided to the area by the city.

All of these issues are still pending in the legislature. Jackson County Judge Rodney Keating is chairman of the local government committee.

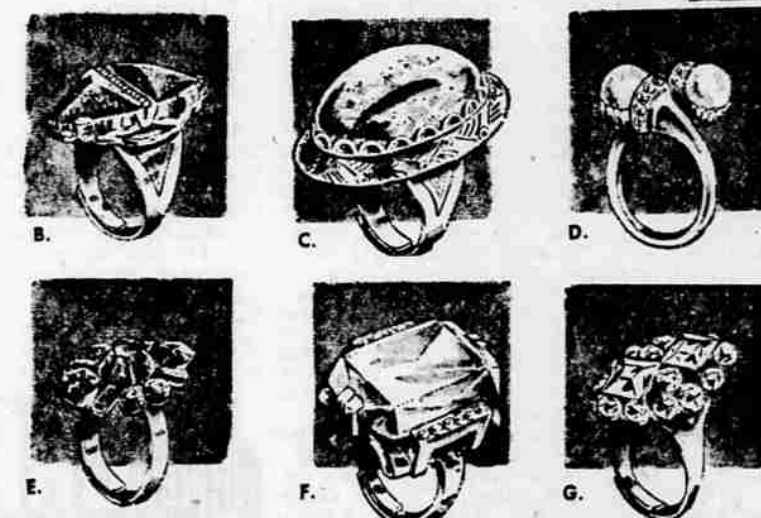
