Twenty Attend Weekend Session For Girl Scouts

The first conference session was held Saturday morning with Mrs. Dorothy Harding, director of religious education at First Methodist church, Eugene, as the keynote speaker on the theme "Friendship." Miss Harding spoke on "How to be a Friend," saying that to be a friend you had to be four things; and individual, a friend to all, a person of imagination and one of love. She told the girls that in their every day conversation they could remember three things— is it true, is it necessary, and is it kind? 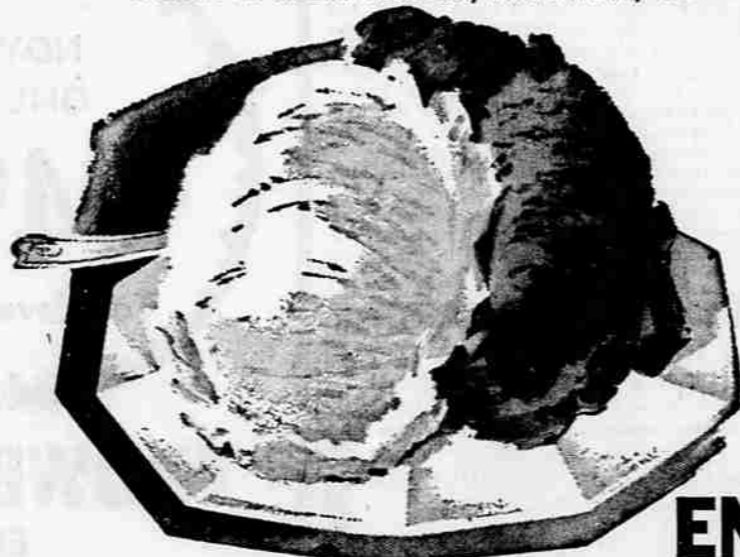
