

BUTTE FALLS Students Try Public Jobs

Butte Falls—Participating in the Student Government Day activities in Medford Tuesday, Feb. 19, were several Butte Falls High school students.

A letter to the Community hall board has been received from Medford Corporation stating that, in addition to the cutting and processing of 20,000 feet of Forest Service timber, an additional 15,140 feet of Medco timber, cut and processed, has been donated to help speed up construction of the Community hall. The total cost of this lumber and labor would have been \$2,413.13.
