Edward G. Robinson's Art Collection Sold

New York (U.P.)—Sale of the bulk of Edward G. Robinson's art collection for more than \$3 million was announced Monday.

In one of the largest art transactions of this century, 58 paintings and one bronze belonging to Robinson were sold to M. Knoedler & Co., Inc., an international art firm. E. Coe Kerr, president of the firm, believed the sale was the largest single art transaction since 1931 when Knoedler's purchased 29 paintings from the Mermittage Museum at Leningrad for \$7 million.

Sale of the art was provided in the terms of an agreement between Robinson and his wife, stemming from her divorce action against the veteran actor.

Robinson said the sale was necessary inasmuch as he could not afford to buy his wife's share of the paintings.

Ike Combatting Persistent Cough

Washington (U.P.)—President Eisenhower told visitors Monday that he is still combatting a cough which has hung on since inauguration.

"I feel very well but I've been having some voice trouble," the President told Ben Nicholson, a British artist.

He added he went to South Georgia for his recent vacation "thinking that it would cure my cough."

"But it didn't, so I'm taking care of it here every day," the President said.

Mrs. Eisenhower remained at the Walter Reed Army hospital overnight but was expected to return to the White House later today. She entered the hospital Friday for her annual physical checkup.

Plane Completes First Polar Trip

Tokyo (U.P.)—A sleek white DC7 passenger liner arrived here today with a plane load of Scandinavian notables to inaugurate the world's first air service over the North Pole between Europe and Asia.

Prince Axel of Denmark, Danish Prime Minister H. C. Hanssen, Norwegian Foreign Minister Halvard Lange and Swedish Cabinet Minister Ingvar Lindell led the group of 47 passengers.

Japanese Transportation Minister Taneo Miyazawa and 50 kimono-clad girls greeted the dignitaries aboard the Scandinavian Airline system's "Gut-torm Viking."

The plane left Copenhagen Sunday. It landed here today 6:12 p.m. Monday (EST) after an elapsed flying time of 31 hours and 38 minutes.

The polar flight cut 20 hours and 2,300 miles off the present air trip between Copenhagen and Tokyo via southern Europe and the Middle East.

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Plans Discussed to Remove Cemetery

Ashland—Bureau of reclamation officials last week discussed two plans for removal of graves from the Hill-Dunn cemetery south of Ashland, a century-old landmark where several of southern Oregon's pioneer settlers are buried.

The cemetery will be inundated when Emigrant lake is expanded in the Talent irrigation project.

J. A. Callan, construction engineer, and Francis O'Connor, also of the bureau of reclamation, presented the plans at a meeting of the Hill Cemetery association.

One plan is for removal of those graves which will be inundated, and the other is for removal of all graves to higher ground. Expense of moving any or all graves will be financed by the government, Callan said.

Association members discussed the plans, but deferred action until a later meeting.

New officers elected to serve while the association is considering the plans are Elmer Hopkins, chairman; Mrs. Homer Grow, secretary-treasurer; and Euck Baer, trustee.

A committee to study the plans include Archie Kincaid, chairman; Philip Dozier, Noel Taulor, Vernon Hopkins, William Givson and W. H. Parker.

Adler, 61, has been coroner since 1932. He was born in Germany and came to America in 1905. He has been married three times and has four children.

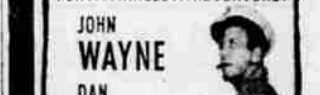

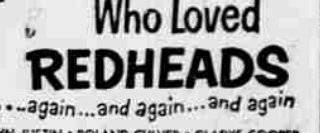
