

# Rosenbluth Spurs NC To 23rd Victory

Lennie Rosenbluth, a Dixie basketball star who grew up in the shadow of Yankee Stadium, and Grady Wallace, a Kentucky-bred jump-shooter, brought new court honors to the Carolinas today.

Rosenbluth had all the clutch points in his bag of 30 Tuesday night to lead North Carolina to a dramatic 69-64 victory over the Forest—putting the nation's No. 1 team just one more win away from a perfect season.

Wallace, racking up 39 points for South Carolina in a triumph over The Citadel, captured the national basketball scoring lead from Mississippi's Joe Gibbon.

North Carolina's win at Winston-Salem gave Coach Frank McGuire's Tar Heels a 23-0 record for the season and left only a Friday night game against Duke on their regular schedule.

Wallace, a product of Mare Creek, Ky., pushed his scoring average to 30.48 points with his latest spurge. The idle Gibbon dropped to second at 30.3. Gibbon has only one more game—Thursday night against Mississippi State. Wallace will play against Clemson Saturday and then, like North Carolina, he goes into the ACC tourney.

Elgin Baylor of Seattle scored a whopping 51 points Tuesday night in a 105-95 victory over Portland to jump from fourth place to third in the scoring derby.

## MVC Probes Accusations On Gambling

St. Louis (U.P.)—Missouri Valley conference officials turned up no leads today in a rumored gambling connection by a suspended referee.

The league president, the Rev. Charles L. Sanderson of St. Louis university, refused to name the referee. He said, "The conference decided not to reveal the name of the official and we will continue that policy."

Commissioner Art Eilers, in Chicago, to run down accusers of the referee, found no evidence to support the rumors.

The referee was suspended after the president of Wichita university reported rumors that Wichita, moving up toward the valley basketball championship until a few days ago, was slated to lose its next three games.

## High Rating

The referee, assigned to work all three games, was to use a "biased" whistle to control the point spread issued by basketball handicappers operating out of Minneapolis, according to rumors.

The official worked the first game, but was withdrawn from the next two, although he received his usual fee.

Coaches in the game gave him a high rating, the referee said. He added that he did not know how the rumors started and he was willing to appear before any investigative body to clarify the situation.

Eilers said the referee had a reputation for independence and ability, and may be the victim of a "whispering campaign."

## LAKERS COULD MOVE

New York (U.P.)—Unless a Minneapolis civic group can match his \$150,000 offer by March 13, former big league manager Marty Marion will become owner of the Minneapolis Lakers pro basketball team and move it elsewhere. Marion and his associate, Milton Fischmann, agreed with Lakers' owner Ben Berger Tuesday on a "provisional" sale of the National Basketball association club.

The New York Knickerbockers, whose chances for a playoff berth get slimmer every day, rolled to an easy 107-76 victory over the St. Louis Hawks at Madison Square Garden after the Celtics cut down the Royals.

Syracuse defeated the Minneapolis Lakers, 120-108, in the only other game played Tuesday night.

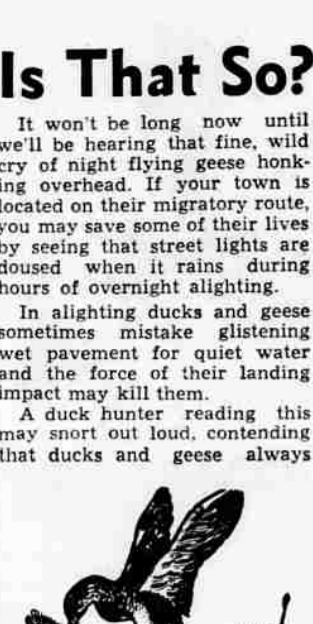
