Paper Publishers, Broadcasters Tell Of Protest To Bill

Salem—(U.P.)—Spokesmen for Oregon newspaper publishers and Oregon broadcasters appeared before the Senate Judiciary committee yesterday in opposition to Senate bill 4, which would repeal a 1955 act limiting the extent of damages that could be recovered in the case of what they called "inadvertent libel."

The 1955 act held the publishers of newspapers and periodicals, and radio and television broadcasters liable for actual damages but relieved them from the filing of punitive libel actions if a retraction was printed before or upon demand where a so-called libel was made without intent, through publication or broadcast of statements later found not to be fact.

Lamar Toozie, Portland attorney, appeared on behalf of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers association, and said that so far as he had been able to determine, the 1955 act had resulted in no abuses, and was intended mainly to discourage "nuisance value" license suits.

Senate bill 4, introduced by Sens. Philip Lowry of Medford, Carl Francis of Dayton and Warren Gill of Lebanon, would return the libel law provisions in Oregon revised statutes to the language of the law before the 1955 legislation was enacted.

X-Ray Examinations Scheduled for Eden
Auckland, N.Z.—(U.P.)—Sir Anthony Eden will be taken to a hospital for x-ray examinations as soon as he is able to travel the 40 miles from his retirement retreat, it was reported today.

Eden has been confined to bed at his retreat near Waiwea since he arrived here to recover from the bouts of fever which forced his resignation as British Prime Minister last month.

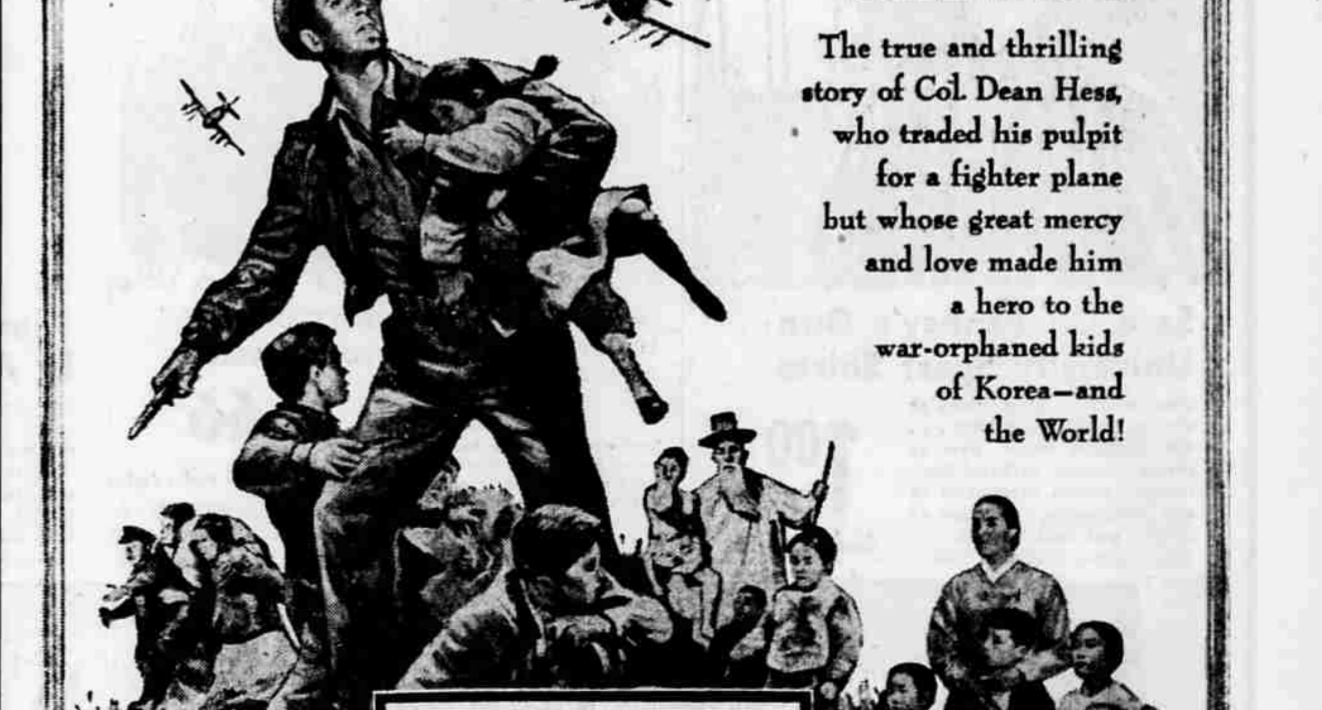
