

**Four Arab Rulers Reach Agreement To Keep Neutrality**

Cairo — (U.P.) — The rulers of four Arab states have reached an agreement on the basis of a resolution proclaiming their "policy of neutrality" in world affairs between the blocs led by the United States and Russia.

The four nations pledged an alliance to work for peace, "impartial and unconditional withdrawal" behind the armistice lines, but did not threaten action if Israel failed to comply.

A communique issued by the governments of Saudi Arabia, Egypt, Jordan and Syria indicated the conference had side-stepped a joint decision on the Eisenhower Doctrine, leaving the way open for any of the four to accept or reject the President's new policies.

The communique did commend the "highly appreciated efforts" of King Saud of Saudi Arabia in explaining Arab policies to President Eisenhower during their Washington talks and making clear Egypt's policy to sovereignty over the Suez Canal. It did not mention Communism.

But in declaring the Arabs will defend themselves without foreign pacts, the four nations showed that the Eisenhower Doctrine failed to win full support. American diplomats had hoped

Portland — (U.P.) — George Nev, 27, of Auburn, Wash., has pleaded guilty to the Jan. 27 holdup of the Metropolitan branch of the U. S. National Bank in which \$360 was taken.

**Wheat Irrigation Outlook Unimproved**

Portland — (U.P.) — A rapid run-off of snow melt in the Willamette valley watershed and the resulting flooding in the northern Oregon area has done nothing to improve irrigation prospects, according to W. T. Frost, water supply forecaster for the federal soil conservation service.

Frost said latest show surveys in the Malheur area have already indicated below normal irrigation supplies and recent snow melt and flooding have dimmed the supply picture even more.

The irrigation outlook will be examined at the first of a series of 10 local water supply forecast meetings that will be held at Vale March 7. Frost will present his current forecasts of the water supply outlook at all the meetings around the state during March and April.

**Black Lace Panties Needed for Ship**

Hollywood — (U.P.) — Designer Helen Rose has three weeks to solve an "unmentionable" problem for the picture "Don't Go Near The Water."

Miss Rose said she needs a pair of black lace panties to be flown from the mast of a U.S. Navy cruiser while a woman war correspondent is aboard, but "they have to be identifiable but not judiciously so."

**Pair Faces Murder Charges in Slaying Of Six in Connecticut**

Hartford, Conn. — (U.P.) — Two men, one of whom was found only last year dead, were charged with the slaying of six persons in Connecticut during a two-month period.

State Police Commissioner John C. Kelly announced Wednesday night that one of the two men had confessed they were responsible for the deaths, at least two of which were Chinese-style executions.

Held here Joseph Taborsky, 33, Brooklyn, N.Y., and formerly of Hartford, and Arthur Colombe, also 33, and a convict of Hartford.

Kelly refused to say which had confessed and implicated the other.

If convicted, Taborsky and Colombe could be executed.

Taborsky and his brother, Albert, were convicted in 1951 of the slaying of Hartford package store dealer during a hold-up.

Sentenced to death, Joseph Taborsky spent four years in death row at Connecticut State Prison during legal efforts to obtain his freedom.

He was freed last year by the state Supreme Court of Errors on the ground that testimony given by Albert Taborsky was invalid because Albert had been adjudged insane and committed to a mental hospital.

**Fruit Buds Ahead Of Normal In Area**

Fruit buds on Rogus valley pear trees are developing considerably ahead of normal, C. D. Cordy, county horticulture agent, stated today.

The early development has been attributed to unusually warm weather for this time of year.

Cordy advised fruit growers to take advantage of good weather in the next 10 days to two weeks to apply dormant spray to pears. The spray should be applied as a protective measure against such diseases as San Jose scale, red mite and pear psylla.

Ten gallons of dormant oil emulsion should be used in combination with either 12 gallons liquid lime sulfur or 20 pounds of polysulphide per acre with air blast sprayers. In hose gun sprayers, two gallons of oil should be used with either three gallons of lime sulfur or 4 1/2 pounds polysulphide per 100 gallons, Cordy said. He added it is important to thoroughly cover tops of trees with the spray.

The county agent noted that the period for spray application will depend on weather conditions. Minimum night temperatures above 45 degrees will tend to bring buds out faster and thus will shorten the spray period. Lower temperatures will lengthen the spray period.

Other elected to offices of the association were Robert Wevesich, state police, vice president; Roy Hanson, Ashland police department, secretary; Paul Matiol, sheriff's office, treasurer; and Bill Koflein, Ashland police department, sergeant-at-arms.

Elected directors of the association were Allan Franke, district attorney's office; Dean DeBerry, sheriff's office; Lyle Pegins, Medford police department; and Walter D. Nunley, Medford attorney. Nunley was also elected an honorary life member of the association.

**Toughen on Russia, Knowland Urges UN**

New York — (U.P.) — Sen. William F. Knowland (R-Calif.) has demanded that the United Nations act promptly to force Russian compliance with its decisions or suspend Russia as a member.

The Senate Republican leader accused the United Nations of lacking the will and "intestinal fortitude" to compel Communist countries to give the same compliance to U.N. rules and actions that is expected and received of non-Communist countries.

**Grand Jury to Hold Session Wednesday**

The Jackson county grand jury will hold session starting at 9 a.m. Wednesday, March 6, District Attorney Thomas Reeder has reported.

This will be the second grand jury session of this year. No new jurors have been called since the panel was selected Jan. 21.

**Organizational Plan Set Up by Assessor**

An organization plan for the county assessor's office has been set up in chart form, according to Ray J. Schumacher, county assessor.

The chart shows the classification of personnel and their work designations.

The organization plan is headed by the assessor with the chief deputy as the administrative supervisor. Further break-down divides the office into two departments, valuation and records. In the valuation group are land, buildings, and personal property appraisers. In the records section are the public service, land classification and personal property clerks.

Schumacher explained that prior to this time a deputy system had been used in the office, which has now been supplanted by the more detailed organizational plan.
