House Lumber Market May Not Improve, Official Says

Eugene — A lumber official reported here last week that marketing of lumber for housing construction is not likely to show much improvement until the end of the present Congressional session.

Joseph W. McCracken, executive vice president of the Western Forest Industries association, discussed a recent trip to Washington, D. C. at a meeting of Eugene area lumbermen.

He described the housing construction picture "as a giant jigsaw puzzle involving national economic policy, political strategy and competition for financing."

McCracken, speaking at a session consisting of the lumber trade association, said it is estimated that construction starts would drop to between \$300 and \$400 million this year. Starts in 1936 dropped to 1,100,000 after the "boom" in 1933 when 1,300,000 new houses were started, he said.

Should the rate of starts drop below one million a year, the lumber official said, the administration could be expected to take further action to bolster the construction industry. White House aides, he added, have indicated the administration is seriously concerned with the condition of the industry, the second largest in the nation.

McCracken commented on current administration efforts to bolster the construction industry through departments under the Housing and Home Finance agency.

"Housing itself," he said in one respect the administration is making itself "unfriendly" because the Housing and Home Finance agency is attempting to pump money into housing construction while the Federal Reserve Board's attempt to curb inflation by raising discount rates has made it more difficult to finance housing.

Moreover, McCracken said, "We feel the result of the F.R.B.'s tight money policy has been to transfer the available credit from housing on which there is an effective curb in its interest rate structure to other industries on which there is no curb."

The Federal National Mortgage association, an agency under the H.M.F.A., has been buying mortgages on the secondary market at the rate of about \$1½ million a month, according to McCracken.

There have been several requests for such a meeting from medical leaders, professional workers with mentally retarded children and from parents. This is the sixth group sponsored by the association to further high mental standards in the county.

Vision Retesting For Drivers Urged

Whenever driver licenses are renewed, the Southern Oregon Optometric society declared today in a Save Your Vision Week statement.

"The national observance of Save Your Vision Week is being celebrated March 3-9 under the sponsorship of the American Optometric association, Inc. Local S.O.O. activities are being sponsored by the Southern Oregon Optometric society."

"About one out of six drivers has a vision problem of which he is not aware," Dr. Robert L. Stephenson, chairman of the Society said. "Only by periodic re-examination are these cases detected."

Lack of funds and personnel usually account for the neglect of vision tests, according to Dr. Stephenson. He pointed out that only three states, Oregon, Missouri and Iowa, require vision after a license has once been granted, even though the driver may be 40 or 50 years older than when he passed the state test.

His top animal was the 1956 State Fair steer champion, and he has exhibited reserve champions several years at the county fair. As an outstanding showman, he has taken the grand championship two years at the county fair.

In addition to Herefords, Smith has been exhibiting Galloways for the past three years. The Galloway is a black animal of Scotch origin, with long black wavy hair, naturally polled, and one considered heavy rustlers. The Galloway is the parent stock of the Aberdeen Angus, and usually are of similar size.

He works for his grandfather, Floyd Charley, on the Central Point farm. There are about 150 acres of crop land and 1,000 head of Hereford cows, 20 head of Galloway, and 50 head of Angus cattle.

Of the 150 head of cattle on the Charley farm, Smith owns eight Hereford cows, four Galloway cows, five steers, eight calves, a yearling heifer, and a one-half interest in a Galloway bull.

Smith's beef projects have received for him the county medal for both meat animal and the boys' agricultural program. In addition, he has won the Ed Pierce trophy as the outstanding hereford exhibitor at the Jackson County Fair, and this past year was awarded the Mann calf as the outstanding beef exhibitor at the Pacific International in Portland.

A senior at Crater High school, he has taken part in the FFA chapter, Photography club, and the track and wrestling teams.

After graduation this spring, he plans to enroll in California Polytechnic college at San Luis Obispo, Calif., to major in a two-year course in animal husbandry.
