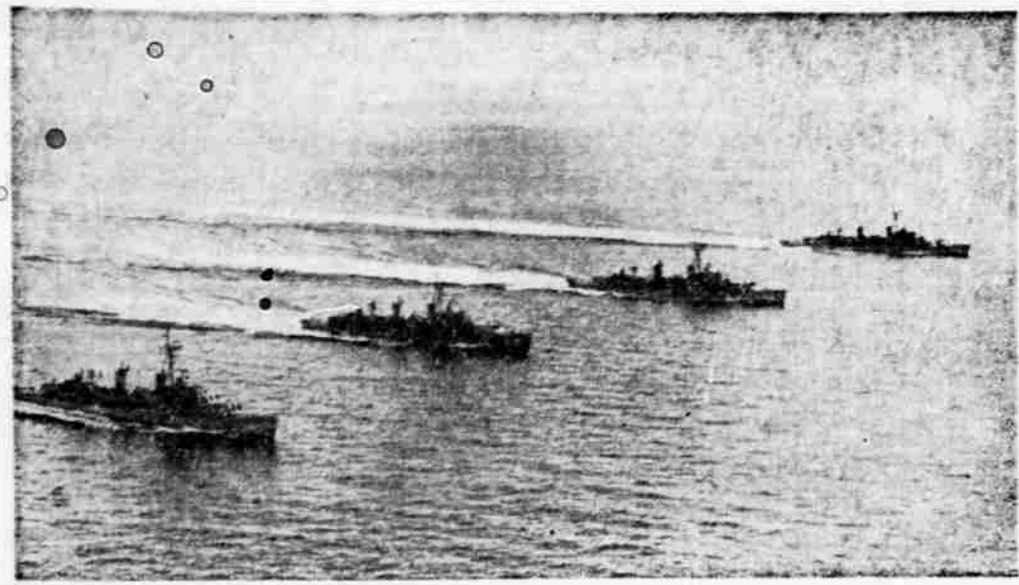


Ben-Gurion's Withdrawal Order Protested

Removal of Senator Knowland as U.S. Delegate to U.N. Suggested

Washington — (UPI) — Palmer Hoyt, publisher of the Denver Post, called today for removal of Senator William F. Knowland as a U. S. delegate to the United Nations. Replying to Knowland's recent speech outlining five "major defects" in the United Nations, Hoyt said the California senator's comments were "dangerously over-exaggerated and distorted" and "contrary to administration policy."

Won't Be Corrected Soon

He conceded that "major and minor defects and imperfections" do exist. But he said they will not be corrected soon, if ever, by "illuminating them with unfair emphasis and casual distortions for whatever purpose — not excluding that of political ambition."

Hoyt, addressing the American Organization for the United Nations at a luncheon session, said Knowland's speech raises the possibility of a "divisive and destructive movement against the United Nations within our own nation."

"The issue here," he said, "is much greater than the views or fortunes of Mr. Knowland. . . . an all-out attack with in the United States . . . is a sword at the throat of this world organization, indeed, at the throat of mankind."

He said U. S. delegates to the United Nations have a duty to "explain, expound and pro-

Chamber Officials Set Legislation Meet

Eight Fined, Two Others Fail To Appear in Court Today

Fined \$25 plus \$5 court costs each by District Judge Rawles Moore were Ernest John Duke-shier, 43, of 11 Jeanette ave., Medford; James Gouriane Morgan, 38, of 825 King st., Medford; James William Scalberg, 37, of route 2, box 848, Central point; Lloyd Bedwell Waller, 65, Grand Hotel; Genaro Vargas, 38, of 763 Posse lane, Medford; Weldy Opton Poff, 50, of 1110 11th st., Medford; Judge Taff Forey, 52, of 1005 East Main st., and Orval Garmit White, 53,

of 1207 West 10th st., Medford, all charged with playing a forbidden game.

Others Charged

Francis Wilson Kirk, 48, of 226 North Front st., owner of the establishment, was charged with permitting gambling on premises, and James William Morgan, 38, of 825 King st., Medford, was charged with dealing a forbidden game. They both posted \$100 bail earlier and were scheduled to appear in district court this morning, but failed to do so. Bench warrants have been issued for their arrest, according to District Attorney Thomas Reeder.

The raid, in which 10 police officers participated, was staged about 9:15 p.m. Saturday after the department and the district attorney's office obtained a search warrant from Judge Moore Friday.

House Bill Would Create Director Of Probations

Advisory Group Would Aid Appointee

Salem — (UPI) — Abolition of the State Board of Probation and Parole and establishment of a fulltime paid director of parole and probation was called for in House bill 645 introduced here today.

Sponsors of the bill, which was recommended by Gov. Robert D. Holmes, were Reps. Norman Howard, Clarence Barton, and Richard Eymann. All are Democrats.

Advisors Would Aid

An advisory committee of three members, all appointed by the governor for four-year terms would aid the new director. Under the bill, all funds of the present state board would be transferred to the director Oct. 1, 1957.

Two anti-discrimination bills were also introduced in the House prohibiting racial, national or religious discrimination in trailer parks and in selling and leasing housing which is financed or guaranteed by any governmental agency.

Reps. Shirley Field and Tom Willner, Portland; Sens. Monroe Sweetland, Milwaukie, Alfred Corbett, Portland, and others sponsored the anti-discrimination legislation.

Accident Bill Offered

Two bills relating to auto accidents would require a person involved in an accident to report to police if others in the accident were dead or injured and would enable a peace officer to arrest anyone in an auto accident if he believes a traffic violation occurred.

A bill introduced at the request of the Oregon Licensed Beverage association would authorize issuance of a liquor license to retail sellers of malt beverages and wines for a \$200 annual fee.

Two San Francisco Men Jailed Here

State police here have apprehended two San Francisco, Calif., men who have been wanted by San Francisco police since Feb. 25 in connection with an armed robbery of a drug store there.

The men are Garth Grant Shoop, 24, and Charles Melvin Shoop, 22, both of San Francisco. Police said a description of the Shoops was received here last week. At 4 p.m. Saturday, an officer observed them walking along Highway 99 past the state police headquarters in north Medford.

Their identity was learned during questioning. The brothers were lodged in the Jackson county jail. They will be held here pending action by California authorities.

Mercy Flights Plane Entry Try Reported

An attempt was made sometime last night to break into a Twin Beechcraft airplane owned by Mercy Flights Inc., while it was parked at the Mercy Flights hanger at the Medford airport, according to city police.

The attempt was reported to police this morning by George E. Milligan, control tower operator and chairman of Mercy Flights. Only damage was to the aircraft's door, police said. It was rendered inoperable during the attempt when someone tried to "jimmie" the lock.

Milligan told officers it was necessary for him to remove one of the windows before he could enter the plane this morning.

TO INTRODUCE ROGUE PROJECT BILL

Proposal To Call For Remaining Basin Structures

Series of Meetings Scheduled in April

Congressman Charles O. Porter plans to introduce a bill to authorize construction of all remaining structures proposed in the Rogue Basin Project report, he said today.

He told other Democratic members of the Oregon delegation of his plans at their regular bi-weekly meeting in Washington, and telephoned the Mail Tribune to report his intentions.

The Rogue Basin Project, as originally proposed by the bureau of reclamation, involved a complex of irrigation, flood control and power facilities embracing the entire Rogue basin, from far up the river down to below Grants Pass, and including works in the Illinois and Applegate drainages.

The multi-million dollar proposal was a center of controversy from the start, between those favoring development, and those who felt that high dams would damage the recreational values of the basin. At a heated hearing in 1948, both sides fought the proposal out, with the result that it has never been seriously proposed.

One segment of it, however—the Talent division project—has been approved by Congress, and is now under construction, at an estimated total cost of some \$22 million.

Porter said the department of the interior has, at his request, drafted a bill to authorize such construction, based on the 1950 report on the Rogue basin project. He said that a report on more recent studies is now nearing completion, and that features of the bill will reflect that study.

Porter declared that the benefit-to-cost ratio of the Rogue Basin Project, estimated to be 3.8 to 1 in 1950, is one of the most favorable for any proposed multi-purpose development in the nation.

He said he is fully aware of the opposition of sports and recreational interests to any plan which includes a high dam on the Rogue river, as is specified in his bill, at Lewis creek.

However, he stated, he feels that the interests of all segments of the economy can be protected, including those of the fish and wildlife interests. He plans to hold a series of meetings in Jackson and Josephine counties in April, at which time details of the proposal can be gone over. The congressman said he believes that he can achieve united support for the expanded proposal from southern Oregon when they see the details of the measure.

Total costs of the proposal are not immediately available, he said, but the estimates will be based on findings in the new bureau report, and inevitably will be higher than the 1950 estimates, which totaled \$78,443,000 based on 1949 cost levels.

Nixon Feels Better; Meets With Premier

Accra, Gold Coast — (UPI) — Vice president Richard M. Nixon, who said he was feeling much better after 10 hours of sleep and a triple dose of antibiotic, held private consultations today with Premier Kwame Nkrumah of the Gold Coast.

First To Be Received

Nixon was the first foreign delegate received in private by Nkrumah, the 44-year-old American-educated African who will lead the new state of Ghana.

The vice president went to bed Sunday night suffering from a light case of the flu, with a temperature of 101. Col. Francis Pruitt, his physician, gave him a triple dose of erythromycin.

This morning after 10 hours of sleep, Nixon's temperature was down and the vice president said he was feeling much better. Pruitt indicated, however, he was keeping his fingers crossed.

Nixon's meeting with Nkrumah was not announced in advance. This indicated it might have been arranged at the last moment.

The vice president said he had a "cordial, frank and complete" exchange of views with the Prime minister during their 33-minute talk. He did not elaborate, but it was believed economic and foreign policies were discussed.

The vice president has been the chief attraction here recently, but he is only one of the 70 chiefs of delegations which will mark the Gold Coast's "independence day" Wednesday when it emerges as the new state of Ghana.

Medford High Delegation Provides Excitement

At Model UN Meeting

The Medford High school delegation provided some excitement at the 10th annual Oregon High School International Relations League conference model United Nations meeting in Eugene last week.

During one session, immediately following a speech by a member of the Russian delegation, an "anti-communist fanatic" jumped from his seat in the second floor bleachers and yelled, "Communist butchers!" The "fanatic" then pulled a gun from his overcoat pocket and fired five shots at the delegation from the USSR.

The "fanatic" (James Boyd from Medford High school) was captured later by "security police." The weapon was a .22 caliber starting pistol. The "fracas" had been planned weeks ago by the Medford delegation.

Approximately 490 students and advisers participated in the MUN at the University of Oregon campus Thursday, Friday and Saturday. This was the first time a high school model U.N. had been held on such a large scale. Oregon IRL officials said.

Bodies of Airplane Crash Dead Removed

Seattle — (UPI) — The bodies of five persons killed in the crash of an Alaska Airlines DC4 Saturday night were brought out from rugged Olympic Peninsula foothills Sunday.

The plane crashed only 18 minutes before it was scheduled to land at Seattle-Tacoma International Airport. A Coast Guard helicopter found the wreckage early Sunday, about 50 airline miles northwest of here.

The plane last was heard from Saturday when pilot Larry Currie of Seattle, flying in "reasonably clear" weather, radioed he was over Dungeness, Wash., a standard check point for inbound Alaska flights. He gave no indication of trouble. The plane crashed minutes later.

Rally Breaks Up In Violence When Students Arrested

Bitter Opposition By Public, Government

Premier David Ben-Gurion today ordered "full and prompt" withdrawal of the Israeli Army from the Gaza Strip and the Gulf of Aqaba area.

There was bitter opposition to the move from parts of the Israeli public and government. A protest rally in Jerusalem broke up in violence when 250 students attempted to march on the Parliament building.

Club-swinging police intercepted the rioting students and arrested 10 of them.

'Act of Faith'

An official source said Ben-Gurion will present Parliament with his decision Tuesday as "an act of faith in the international community."

Within four hours of Ben-Gurion's decision, Maj. Gen. E. L. M. Burns, commander of the UN Emergency force, announced "full agreement in principle" on technical details of the Israeli pullout from Egyptian territory.

Burns refused to say when the long awaited withdrawal would begin.

After a 50-minute conference at Lydda airport outside Tel-Aviv with Maj. Gen. Moshe Dayan, chief of staff of the Israeli army, Burns said that he would report immediately to U. N. Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold in New York.

Burns refused to say whether Egyptian troops would be allowed back into the Gaza strip, one of the main objections offered by Israel against a withdrawal of its forces.

"It is not my concern—it is a political question," Burns said. "I am not aware of the possibility of the return of the Egyptians into Gaza—nor otherwise."

Burns and Dayan met after Ben-Gurion ordered his army head to proceed immediately with plans for the Israeli withdrawal.

The move climaxed a hectic week end in Ben-Gurion's battle to comply with U.N. demands that Israel leave Egypt's territory without toppling his own coalition government, in which opposition elements bitterly opposed withdrawal.

Arabs Issue Warning

Determined to end the crisis, Ben-Gurion called ministers and political leaders to his home one at a time during the morning, and then reached his decision to act now. Without the formality of seeing either the Cabinet or the Parliament, the word went out to Dayan to get started.

This was the picture in other capitals on the Mideast situation: In Cairo, the Arab League warned the United States of the "dangers" arising from Israel's "procrastination" in withdrawing from Gaza and Aqaba.

In Amman, Jordan's minister of state for foreign affairs, Abdullah Ramawi, said any attempt to internationalize the Gulf of Aqaba will meet with flat refusal from the Arab nationalist powers.

The Soviet communist organ Pravda said in Moscow that the U.S.-Israeli "plans" to replace Israeli troops with U.N. forces in Gaza amounts to a continuation of aggression against Egypt.

Planners to Discuss Annexation, Change

The Medford planning commission will consider recommendations on a proposed Berdyale area annexation at a special meeting at 7:30 p.m. today in the city hall.

The committee will consider a request for a change of zone from class 1A (single family) to class 11A (limited commercial) of property south of Crater Lake highway and southwest of Delta waters rd.

Helicopter Service Soon For President Eisenhower

Washington — (UPI) — The White House said today that new helicopter service for President Eisenhower will be put into operation in about two months.

No Truth in Report

Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said the Air Force will put two small helicopters at the disposal of the chief executive to transport him between the south grounds of the White House and the Washington National Airport.

Hagerty said there was no truth in a report that the helicopters were being added to the transportation services of the White House to carry the President to the Burning Tree Golf club.

"The only run now being planned is from the White House to the Military Air Transport Service terminal at the airport," he said.

Other Uses Possible

Hagerty said that once the helicopters prove themselves in service, Mr. Eisenhower might use them for short trips to a number of places, including the Eisenhower farm at Gettysburg, Pa.

Hagerty said that eventually the helicopters might be used to go to Burning Tree, but that so far, air transport to the golf club had not been discussed or considered at the White House.
