

H. ROZMAN TAKES OVER CLASS A SINGLES LEAD IN STATE BOWLING RIVALRY

Lucca Rozman, Eugene, and Helen Rozman, Klamath Falls, assumed Class A leadership in the highlight performance of the fifth week end in the Oregon Women's Bowling Association's 15th annual tournament at Medford Bowling lanes.

The Eugene lady, who had never before tabulated a 600 series, grabbed the singles leadership of her division with a 607 score, five pins under the Class A record and eight under the all-time tournament singles high. A 157 average keeper, she had games of 204, 196 and 207 to push the 607 total of the previous leader, Janet Harman, of Portland, into second place.

Lucca Lounge took over team command with a 2513 count, dropping Ray Buick, Gresham, to second with its 2508 score.

There were only two other new first place holders among the 16 categories after the three days of activity. The 840 of Virginia Finch and Irene Doty, Roseburg, was good for the front position in Class D doubles. Sally Mareno, Roseburg, carded a 1435 to go ahead in Class C all-events.

The tournament will wind up here next week end with appearance of lady bowlers on Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Record 612

In her sparkling series Helen Rozman came close to the Class A mark of 612 set by Louise Snidow, Seaside, in 1954. Top singles score in tournament history is the 615 by Vera Crabbaugh, Coos Bay, in 1951 and Crabbaug.

Two Klamath Falls women failed yesterday in their aim for a successful doubles and singles titles defense but they paced the Lucca Loungers to their triumph. Mary Bothwell and Layne Harris, who took the Class A singles in 1956 with 1094, combined for a 1013 this time for 10th in the standings. Mrs. Harris, singles champ last year with a 597 had only a 502 in that department yesterday to wind up well down the list. However, she took over 10 position in Class A all-events with 1552.

For Lucca on Saturday evening Mrs. Harris had a 521, Mrs. Bothwell 509, Vita Carson 500, Clara Beard 494 and Doris Benedict 489.

In Class D doubles the Finch and Doty duo took over the lead from Lucille Williams and Fern Simpson, Albany, who now have second with 836. Sally Mareno in Class C all-events, replaces another Roseburg woman, Helen Carter, now in No. 2 spot with a 1435.

Hope Still Held For Third Major Baseball League

San Francisco — (U.P.) — The quivering Pacific Coast League may yet become a major league, providing "no invasion is made during the next four years."

That's the opinion of J. Fred David, Sacramento Solon president and long time foe of major league expansion to the West Coast.

The peppery David did an about face Saturday by joining the seven other PCL club owners in approving Brooklyn's purchase of the Los Angeles Angels, long owned by Phil Wrigley's Chicago Cubs. He originally was outspoken in his opposition to the move.

But Sunday he reemphasized his hopes for a third major league.

"You might say the next four year period will be the critical one in which big league teams will decide whether to move out here or not," he said.

"In the meantime, if given the proper cooperation, the Pacific Coast League could continue to grow toward major league status just as the region is growing."

California Back in Charge In PC Conference Chase

California, back in charge of the Pacific Coast Conference basketball race by half a game, winds up its season next week end against Southern California where the Trojans are drooling to get the Bears in Pan Pacific auditorium.

For Troy is hot and rates now as a kingmaker in the hectic race even if it is barred from the NCAA tournament along with UCLA and Washington as a result of last summer's gridiron probe.

It was Southern California which duped UCLA, 84 to 80, last Tuesday to knock the Bruins off stride in their battle to edge Cal out for the conference crown. UCLA and the Bears then split their crucial series and now the Bruins have to meet Southern California in another Tuesday game at Pan Pacific which will close out the Uclans' season.

In the meantime, Southern California swept two from Oregon during the week end to keep humming while Washington stood idle. The Huskies stood to move into the PCC title providing they took two from weak Washington State next week while Southern California was stampeding UCLA and Cal.

Another big one is slated for San Francisco's Kezar Pavilion on Tuesday where USF meets St. Mary's in the last tilt of the season with a full game lead over the Gaels. Script writers would have preferred to see the teams clash even up with the California basketball title at stake but Santa Clara spoiled everything by trimming St. Mary's, 62 to 53, on Saturday.

Cal, which had been defeated 71 to 66 on Friday by UCLA, bounced back to down the Bruins, 73-68 on Saturday.

Cellar dwelling Oregon held a 39 to 37 lead over the Trojans at the intermission then wilted before a rally sparked by Danny Rogers and Dick Pugh. The Trojans won 71 to 62.

Stanford defeated Idaho, 71 to 63, to end its season by splitting with the Vandals and winding up in the second division. Dick Haga led the Indians with 20 points. In the other PCC game, Oregon State tuned up for the cellar dwelling Webfoots by downing Washington State, 70 to 49, to take that series.

In the Class A-2 bracket, Toledo and Reedsport meet tonight for one berth after Reedsport posted a 58-50 win over its coast neighbors Saturday. Glide and Phoenix also have a playoff game after Glide evened their series with a 64-47 Saturday win.
