Tucson, Ariz.—(U.P.)—Tucson police were investigating today to determine whether a trunk containing \$200,000 in diamond jewelry had been "misrouted."

The trunk disappeared from the Southern Pacific Railroad baggage room here sometime between 11:30 a.m. and 12:43 p.m. Monday. Fred J. Cannon, jewelry salesman for the Cannon-Schaefer agency in Los Angeles, reported the steamer-type trunk contained three sample cases of jewelry which he had displayed to Tucson retailers a short time earlier.

Cannon, 62, San Marino, Calif., told police he put the jewels back in the trunk and left it at the station while he returned to his hotel room to check out. He went to the station to check his luggage through to El Paso.

The committee on the Federal Home Loan Bank system concentrates its studies on the effectiveness of the Federal Home Loan Bank system, which operates as a central reserve banking system for savings associations and cooperative banks under government supervision.

Ferry Suspended; Tax Agents Walk

Astoria — (U.P.) — A couple of Oregon tax agents have discovered the peril of serving tax subpoenas on ferry boat operators.

Tax agents William Huhta and Henry Boyd parked their car on the Oregon shore and boarded the West-Puget Island ferry in order to serve papers on owner-operator Elmer Danielson. Danielson accepted service during the trans-Columbia trip and then announced on the Washington shore that he was suspending service. Huhta and Boyd were forced to make a three-hour hitchhiking trip via Longview back to their car.

Oregon has been attempting to collect taxes from Danielson since 1945. He contends that he operates out of Washington and pays taxes in that state. Oregon taxes, he argued, would constitute double taxation.

A member of the Danielson family said yesterday that unless the tax dispute can be settled the ferry would remain out of service.

Arizin Has Pro Hoop Scoring Lead

New York — (U.P.) — The Philadelphia Warriors and Boston Celtics are set to grab the lion's share of individual honors in the National Basketball association with only one week left to play in the regular season.

Official weekly statistics show today that Pitchin' Paul Arizin has taken over the individual scoring lead from injured Bob Pettit of the St. Louis Hawks by a margin of 26 points. Since Pettit is playing only a few minutes per game with one arm in a cast, Arizin's second scoring crown now is a cinch.

That will give the Warriors two individual titles, for Neil Johnston apparently has the field wrapped up with a 455 mark compared with 441 for Jack Twyman of Rochester.

The Celtics also are assured of two titles— in assists with, as usual, Bob Cousy, and in free throw shooting, again as usual, with Bill Sharman. Cousy has 460 assists to 323 for Jack McMahon of St. Louis; Sharman has a 910 free throw average to 900 for Adolph Schayes of Syracuse.

The only other individual crown is in rebounding, and that is reserved for Maurice Stokes of Rochester. The former St. Francis of Loretto, Pa., star has 1,192 rebounds and already has set a new league record. Pettit is his nearest rival with 981.

NBA Players to Fight For Shares in Playoffs

New York — (U.P.) — National Basketball Association players will fight for shares in a \$51,000 pool in their league playoffs starting March 16, league President Maurice Podoloff announced today.

The Boston Celtics already have earned \$4,000 from the jackpot by winning the Eastern Division championship, and they probably will receive another \$1,000 for finishing the regular season with the best winning percentage in either division.

Hartack Has Hot Horses

Hallandale, Fla.—(U.P.)—Willie Hartack, who rode 62 winners during the 40-day Hialeah Park meeting, drew two more "hot" horses for today's opening program at Gulfstream Park.

The 1955-56 national jockey champion was scheduled to ride Calumet Farm's Fabius in the \$10,000 added Armed Handicap, a six-furlong spin named in honor of a former Calumet stakes winner.

In a six-furlong race preceding the feature, Hartack will be aboard Barbizon, another member of the successful Calumet stable who will be making his 1957 debut.

Barbizon was the nation's outstanding juvenile last year when he won five of six starts, including the Garden State Stakes.

Hartack completed his successful Hialeah stand Monday when he piloted Mrs. Eugenia Bankhead's Jabneh to victory in the \$106,350 Hialeah Turf Handicap.

HOCKEY

Montreal—(U.P.)—Gordie Howe, Detroit's versatile right wing, retained his two-point lead over his teammate Ted Lindsay today in his bid for a fifth National Hockey League scoring championship.

Howe picked up one goal and one assist last week to increase his season total to 79 points.

New York — (U.P.) — Fred Glover of the Cleveland Barons, a nine-year veteran in the American Hockey League, seems a sure bet to win his first scoring title this season.

The 29-year-old right wing scored six points in last week's action to bring his total to 91 through Sunday's games. This burst enabled him to increase his lead over teammate Jimmy Moore to eight points with only eight games remaining on the schedule.

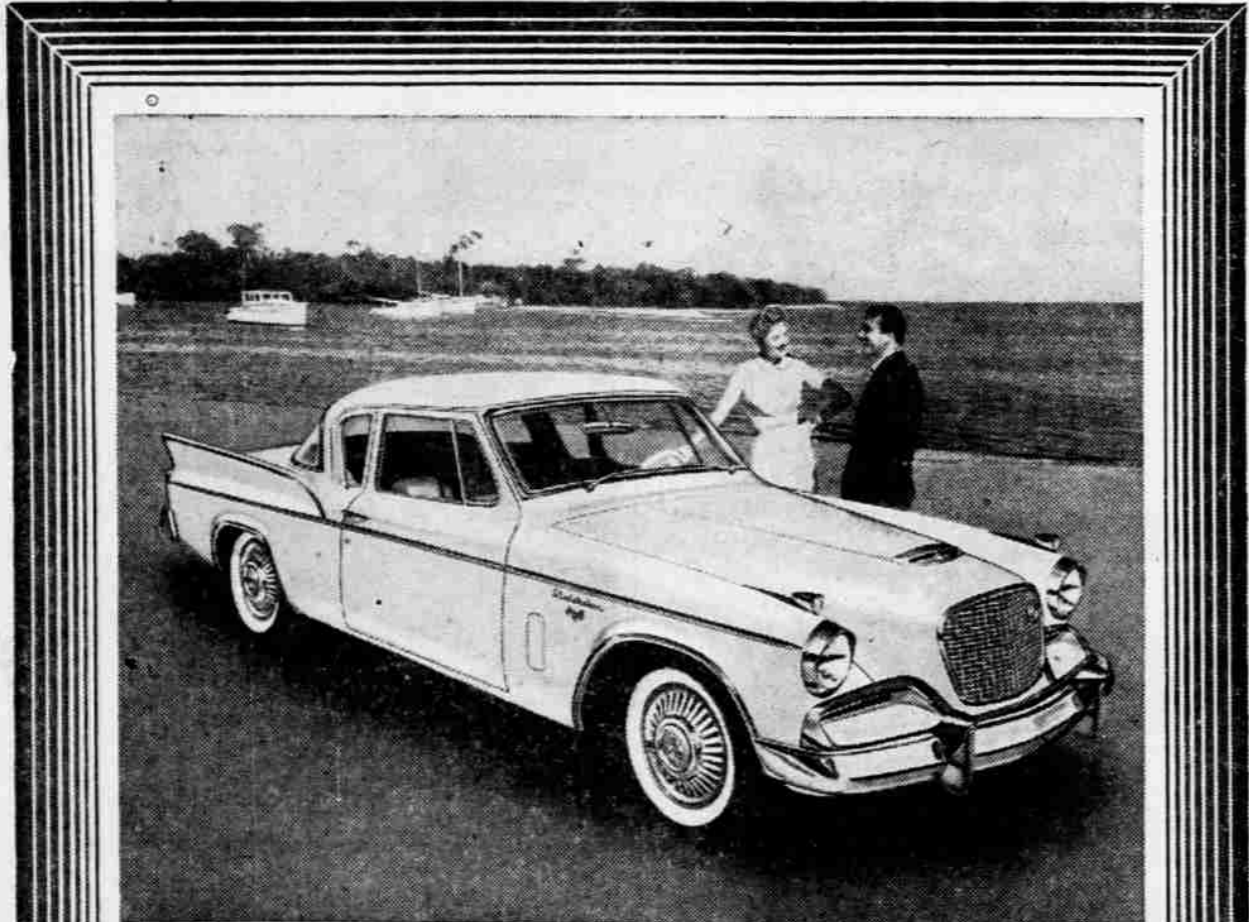
Trotting Group Names Wiswall Board Head

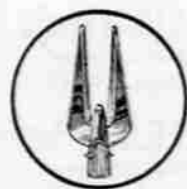
