# West in Position to Strike Death Blow to Communism, Speaker Says

Nations of the West are in a position now to strike a death blow to world communism, according to Archduke Otto of Austria who spoke at a meeting of Rogue Valley Knife and Fork club last night at Rogue Valley Country club.

"The road ahead is now clear, and there is a possibility of victory without war if we take the right course," the archduke stated.

The speaker declared that recent events in East Germany, Poland and Hungary, and even in Russia itself, strongly indicated that "we can hope for a peaceful liberation of the communist front 'would crumble' if the right forces were brought to bear.

**Follows Pattern**  
This trend is not only indicated by current events, but follows a pattern of the past which shows that "history often intervenes" in an unpredictable fashion, he said.

The speaker declared that the Soviets are in the midst of a multiple crises involving youth, leadership of the communist party, the economy of the nation, agriculture and domestic and foreign policies. "The ball has started rolling," he said, "and it now is the duty of the free world to carry on."

Archduke Otto stated that the youth crises is indicated by the Hungarian revolt, which he said was led by "youths from 11 to 24 years of age" and by the fact that even Pravda, the communist publication, recently wrote "youth organizations are becoming the rallying point for counter-revolution." This youth revolt was a surprise to both the Eastern and Western countries, he added, because it had been believed that one generation of complete indoctrination in the Communist way of life would result in a total loss of the sense of freedom.

**Leadership Crisis**  
Speaking of the leadership crisis, Archduke Otto said "the Soviet suit was cut to fit the giants (Lenin and Stalin) and the men in Moscow are now much too small." He pointed to the handling of the Hungarian

revolt again as proof that Russian leaders lack the force to cope with emergencies. Of the economic crisis, he said that while maintaining the lowest possible standard of living for the masses, the Russian leaders had let heavy industry become top heavy and added "you cannot develop one branch of a county's economy to the detriment of the others." He pointed out that when the standard of living was allowed to go up slightly, unrest developed to the point where it brought about the ousting of Malenkov and appointment of Bulganin, who returned to the tough theories of Stalin.

Speaking of agriculture, the speaker said Russia has great supplies of food in the rural areas, but not enough in the cities and that unemployment in a nation which once boasted that it had a system which did away with unemployment, rose last year to 4 million.

**Domestic Policy**  
Discussing the domestic and foreign policy crisis, Archduke Otto said that once Russia was all-powerful in the communist orbit, but now it has to share power with China. This began to happen as soon as "Stalin, the fighter, was replaced by fat bureaucrats," he declared and added that "the center of gravity in the communist party has started moving from Moscow towards Peking."

He cautioned that this should not bring about the optimistic idea that Russia and China would ever go to open war, because of territorial conflicts, pointing out that China's eyes are on southeast Asia, where she has hopes of territorial expansion.

The speaker also cautioned against believing that because of these conditions in Russia and in the communist party, the danger of world war is necessarily past. "Countries often try to solve their internal problems by international adventure," he warned.

**West Might Offer**  
Turning to the point of what the West might offer Russia in return for its withdrawal from Europe's communist-dominated nations, he said "We have already offered Russia everything on a silver platter" by way of the Yalta agreement and through other channels. However, it still may be that "pulling out" would be the lesser of two evils for Russia, he added, and said "The most important consequence of the Hungarian revolution apparently is never mentioned in the United States."

This was the behaviour of the Hungarian army, he explained, saying that one-third openly went over to the Hungarian revolutionists and the other two-thirds "dissolved." Russian leaders now know "a million fighting men in other satellite nations have been made useless and must be replaced with expanded Russian reserves," he added.

**Military Strength**  
Outlining what he believes to be the best course of action for the Western powers, the archduke said they should build up their classical military strength in Europe, since nuclear power is stalemated, and show Russia she cannot count on "an easy push to the Atlantic coast in case of war," that the Western countries should re-affirm their solidarity; that we should get over the idea that we cannot send arms into countries because it might provoke war; that we should foster the present poor relations between the Red army and the communist party; that we should take a stand against the Soviet Union everywhere, at every point, economically, politically and diplomatically.

"You'd be astounded how fast the communist front would crumble under such an onslaught," he predicted.

**Christian Principles**  
All this will be successful, however, only if it is accompanied by a "rededication to the great Christian principles," he stressed and added that communism flourished only because of an absence of "positive religion," and not because of poverty or economic reasons. The speaker also emphasized that "victory will be to no avail if we don't quell the idea of totalitarianism."

During a lengthy question period Archduke Otto was asked about the new Eisenhower policy for the Middle East countries and gave it his hearty approval. He said the "area of disagreement between the Arab states and Israel has been considerably whittled down," adding that much of the trouble would die out if Israel's borders could be

adjusted in eight places. He proposed that a loan be floated in the UN countries to provide money to finance resettlement of the Arab refugees and said that if trade between the Arab nations and Israel could be once established, many problems would disappear.

**Influence of UN**  
Asked about the influence of the UN, Archduke Otto spoke out strongly against Dag Hammarskjold, implied that the UN secretary general has been too much influenced by the Russians and said Hammarskjold's handling of the Hungarian crises had been very bad. Questioned about Germany, he said chances of reunion are remote. Asked about Tito, he said this leader had shown his true colors during the Hungarian revolt and predicted that "if there is a general conflict, Tito will act as a communist and not as the leader of a free country."

Archduke Otto was introduced by President Neil Davidson.
