Thirty-six men were presented scholarship certificates and a scholarship plaque was awarded to the floor with the highest grade point average.

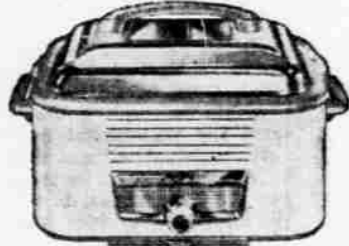

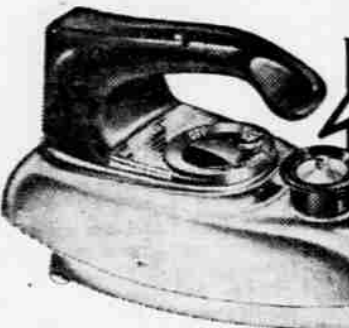

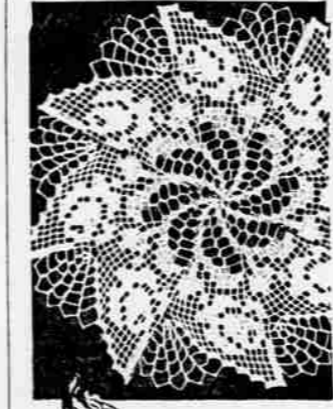
