Hells Canyon Issue Disputed

Washington—(UP)—Remergency of the hotly disputed Hells Canyon dam project as a political issue was evident today after the opening of a Senate hearing on the controversial subject.

Republican and Democratic legislators quickly chose sides as the three day hearings began yesterday in Sen. Clinton P. Anderson's irrigation and reclamation sub-committee.

Sens. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) and Henry Dworshak (R-Ida.) were the first to square off.

"In public test after public test, the free men and women of the region have voted for the high (Hells Canyon) dam," Morse said. He criticized the Eisenhower administration for supporting the Bruce Eddy dam instead of Hells Canyon and said this was a "desperate attempt" to compensate for the greater benefits of the upper Snake river project.

Dworshak interrupted and said he "resented" the Oregon senator's "inference" that Bruce Eddy was "merely an alternative" to Hells Canyon.
