## Building Permit Value Shows Decrease Here

Value of building permits issued in Medford for February totaled \$180,365, compared to \$301,527 for February in 1956, according to H. E. Mackie, city building superintendent.

Among permits issued were 13 new residences, \$144,000; eight remodeled residences, \$8,325; six businesses remodeled, \$17,450; two new minor buildings, \$3,500; and seven new signs, \$3,790.

## Text of Release From Porter On Bill for Rogue Basin Job

(Editor's note: Following is the full text of the press release issued earlier this week in Washington, D.C., by Congressman Charles O. Porter, in which he announced plans to introduce a bill to authorize construction of the rest of the Rogue River Basin Project, of which the Talent project so far is the only part under construction.)

Congressman Charles O. Porter this week disclosed his intention of introducing a bill to authorize construction of the remaining features of the Rogue River Basin reclamation project.

"I am presently working on the final draft of a bill to be introduced this session which will authorize an overall basin plan, including both tributary and main stream works—for which there is a pervading need," Rep. Porter stated.

Rep. Porter noted that the Rogue River basin embraces all of Josephine county, nearly all of Jackson county, and a large part of Curry county and said, "Best use of the potentials of such development for economic purposes such as irrigation, flood control and power, will bring to this southwest corner of Oregon the pre-eminence destiny has long held in store for it."

Bill Drafted

"At my request," the Oregon Democrat continued, "the Department of the Interior has drafted a bill based on the 1950 report of the bureau of reclamation, excepting those portions already authorized under the Talent Division act. A great deal of study has been given to the Rogue River basin since that time and I expect to have these results crystallized shortly and to make the necessary revisions to this bill."

"I cannot overestimate the increasing need for and importance of the full development of the basin to broaden and stabilize the economic base upon which the people depend for their livelihood," Porter said.

"Tremendous population rises in the Rogue River basin have far outrun the resource developments capable of supporting that population permanently at an adequate level of living."

"Most of the increased population has been dependent on stepped up operations of the lumber industry; a pace which cannot be conscientiously supported on a long run basis without seriously depleting the forest resources of the basin."

Agricultural Development

"Additional agricultural development is urgently needed and appears to be the only type of basic resource development available for establishing permanent economic stability for the Rogue River basin," Porter emphasized, adding, "Furthermore, the only feasible method of increasing significantly the level of agricultural development, is through expanded irrigation."

"Hydroelectric power production and flood control can and should be important incidental purposes served by the facilities constructed primarily for irrigation."

"However, the features of this

extensive project with respect to flood control should not be underestimated. Rogue river and its principal tributaries are subject to frequent floods. The basin faces very serious losses and substantial damage to the highly developed lands adjacent to the stream courses in the central, valley segment.

"The flood of December, 1955 (another occurred in February, 1956) was the largest flood of record, resulting in damages exceeding that of any previous flood."

Power Development

"Hydroelectric power and flood control development have fallen far short of meeting the needs of expanded economy in the Rogue River basin. Arthur M. Piper, chairman of the Pacific Northwest field committee, department of the interior, made this significant statement in October, 1956:

"According to data prepared in 1950, the power industry within the basin consisted of five hydroelectric plants of the California-Oregon Power company, a privately owned plant at Gold Hill, a small municipal plant at Ashland, two small internal-combustion plants near Gold Beach, and a few small plants installed by industrial firms to provide power. Installed capacity was rated at 59,000 kilowatt-amperes for a total annual energy output of 365,100,000 kilowatt-hours. Total energy requirements within the Oregon portion of the market area supplied by the Rogue river and adjoining areas was 709 million kilowatt-hours.

"Since 1950, even with new facilities constructed on the North Umpqua river by the California-Oregon Power company, local generating capability has fallen far short of the energy requirement of the area. The deficit has been made up by importing power from the Copco system in California and from other outside sources.

"Additional generating capacity of nearly 700,000 kilowatts exist potentially in the Rogue River basin..."

Economic Justification

"There is strong economic and financial justification for a comprehensive plan to attain the needed irrigation, power and flood control development in the basin. The benefit-cost ratio is very favorable," Oregon's fourth district representative noted.

"I recognize the significant fish and wildlife resources and scenic grandeur of the Rogue River basin and the adjoining forest wilderness areas which not only serve the people who live here, but also attract visitors from all over the west and the nation, and as such contribute to one of Oregon's greatest industries, our tourist trade.

"My bill will take into account conservation of both fish and recreation resources," Porter concluded.

## Crown Zellerbach Told To Sell St. Helens Mill

Washington—(U.P.)—A Federal Trade Commission examiner ordered the Crown Zellerbach Corporation of San Francisco to sell St. Helens Pulp and Paper Company, a West Coast competitor it bought in 1953.

FTC Examiner Earl J. Kolb ruled the acquisition violates the anti-merger law.

Kolb said the stock purchase of the company by Crown Zellerbach as substantially "lessened competition" and "tended toward monopoly" in the production and sales of coast papers in the West.

## Negro Slays Reveler In Mardi Gras Parade

New Orleans—(U.P.)—A bystander shot to death a Tulane university student wearing a convict's suit in a crowd of costumed Mardi Gras revelers Tuesday night at the height of the pre-Lenten festivities.

Police said August Joseph During, 27, Korean war veteran and an electrical engineering student, was shot down by a Negro armed with a .32 automatic pistol and carrying a tambourine.

During, one of a group of students wearing broad-striped convict suits and masks, was snake-dancing in the street when one of his companions apparently jostled the Negro, who immediately opened fire, police said.

The Negro, identified as Joseph O. Jenkins, 25, was caught after a foot chase of several blocks and held on suspicion of murder. The pistol, with one bullet left, and the tambourine was found tossed in a gutter.
