Frank McGuire Mentor of Year

New York — (U.P.) — Frank McGuire, who transferred his big grin and a bevy of talented college basketball players from New York to the University of North Carolina, today was voted United Press Coach of the year.

McGuire's Tar Heels, nine of whom hail from the New York City area, swept 24 games to become the only major college able to finish the regular 1956-57 season with a perfect record. This showing earned McGuire coach of the year honors by a huge margin in a nationwide poll of 267 sports writers and broadcasters.

The 42-year-old coach received 150 votes, 54 per cent of the total cast although 33 coaches were mentioned on the ballots.
