There will be approximately 25,000 members in attendance, of which the United States will send 250. After the Rome Pilgrimage, a tour of Europe, including visits to Germany, Belgium, Yugoslavia, England and France, has been planned for the American group.

Teachers To Attend Convention

Portland—An estimated 6,000 educators from all parts of Oregon will converge on Portland Thursday for the 54th annual convention of the Oregon Education association, March 14 to 16.

Attending from Jackson county will be Mrs. Maxine Smith, Mrs. Ivah D. Murray and Lee Ragsdale, Medford; Mrs. Mae Richardson, Central Point; Bruce Bray, Dr. Jane Dale, and Mrs. Ethel Reid, Ashland. Mrs. Smith is president of the Department of Classroom Teachers and Mrs. Murray is president of the Department of Retired Teachers.

While public school pupils generally are having "spring vacation", Oregon teachers will be acquiring new knowledge and inspiration at the convention, according to association officials. Educational leaders will speak to participants, some 22 subject-fields will hold demonstrations and discussions of new teaching methods and materials, and new fields of education will be explored.

Dr. L. D. Haskew, dean of the college of education at the University of Texas, is scheduled as a principal speaker during general sessions. He is a member of the Educational Policies commission and former president of the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education. Oregon's Governor Robert D. Holmes will address the general convention banquet Thursday night.

Other speakers include Dr. John H. Furbay of New York City, lecturer and explorer, and Carl C. Byers of Parma City, Ohio, a writer and lecturer in education.

A special event of the convention will be a workshop on educational television at the Portland studios of KGW-TV. Station staff and educators will cooperate in discussion and demonstration of this new educational field.

Educational leaders from Oregon communities will take part in the various programs being presented. The OEA will also announce the name of an Oregonian selected as the "Education Citizen of the Year."

Major departments of the OEA will also hold meetings during the convention. These include the Oregon Association of School Administrators, Department of Higher Education, Oregon Elementary School Principals Association, and the Department of Classroom Teachers.
