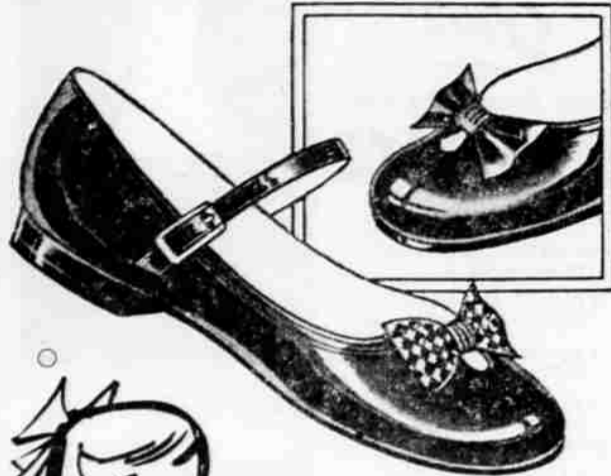
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Play Given For Eagle Point PTA At Last Meeting

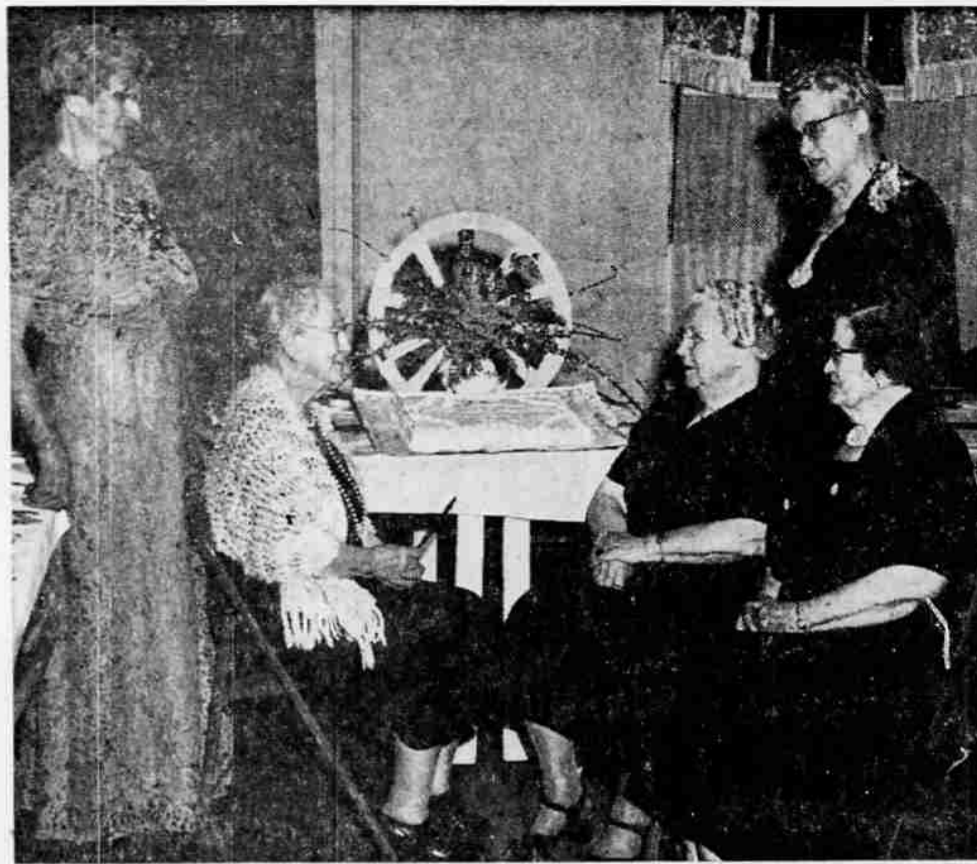
Mrs. Bill Pomeroy, Mrs. Lester McFall and Mrs. Clayton Simmons were elected as a nominating committee for the year 1957-58.

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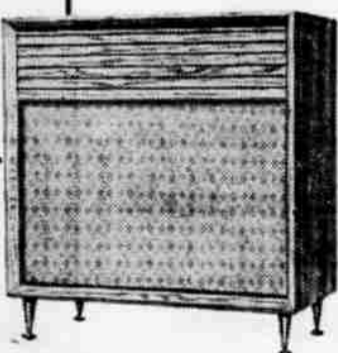
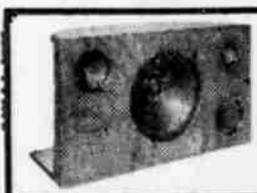
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Mushroom Club Elects Officers; Purpose Stated

Jacksonville—Mrs. Lawrence Luy spoke for members of Jacksonville Garden Club at a meeting February 28 in the Community club rooms.

Mrs. Luy spoke on perennial borders, and stressed the use of shrubs as a background which would give a more pleasing effect. By careful selection of plants one may have continuous bloom from early spring till late fall, she said.

Mrs. W. W. Wingham spoke on forcing flowers for early bloom. After cutting branches, bruise or pound the stems with a hammer. This enable them to take up water more rapidly, then submerge them over night in luke warm water.
