House Debating Asking Eisenhower How To Cut Budget

Washington—U.P.—The House was embroiled today in a partisan fight over whether to ask President Eisenhower's "advice" on how to cut his peacetime record \$1.8 billion spending budget.

Democrats hoped by late afternoon to ram through the House and speed to the White House an unprecedented resolution requesting Mr. Eisenhower to say where—and how deeply—he thinks his budget can be cut. Senate action is not required.

Resolution Denounced
Outnumbered Republicans denounced the resolution as a "partisan" maneuver, cooked up by the Democratic Congress to "shirk" its responsibility for budget-cutting and "pass the buck to the President."

Democrats retorted Mr. Eisenhower should be happy to tell Congress of any cuts that can be made in his budget. They noted the President indicated last week spending might be trimmed by slowing down some federal projects. Democrats felt the resolution would at least dramatize the fact that Mr. Eisenhower is the author of the huge spending budget. Some felt that Treasury Secretary George M. Humphrey's suggestion that Congress cut the budget had shifted public criticism of big spending from the White House to the Democratic Congress.

Influenza Epidemic Closes Idaho Schools

Influenza in epidemic proportion has struck the University of Idaho and schools at Clarkston, Wash., and Lewiston. Doctors at the university said about 10 per cent of the 3800 students enrolled were ill. The infirmary was filled and many students were confined to beds in their living quarters.

At Lewiston, the junior and senior high schools were closed. They were closed last Friday in hopes the situation would improve during the week end, but classes were dismissed again yesterday when 900 students and 23 teachers were absent. About 25 per cent of the students in grades one through 12 were ill. Across the Snake river at Clarkston, 291 students or 14 per cent of the enrollment were absent but schools remained open.

Community College Bill Approved at Citizens Hearing

Salem—U.P.—Approval of House bill 594 enabling school districts to set up community colleges in Oregon was voiced by educators, labor representatives and private citizens at a hearing here last night.

The bill is the result of study by a joint committee of the Board of Education and the State Board of Higher Education which investigated Oregon junior college needs last year.

Would Need Approval
School districts with a true cash value of \$20 million and at least 500 students in grades 9 to 12 could set up community colleges with the approval of the State Board of Education and a vote of the people.

Robert W. Chandler, editor and publisher of the Bend Bulletin, told the House Education Committee that Oregon's pilot community college, the Central Oregon Community college at Bend, had been "most successful" in its seven years of operation.

Chandler said House bill 594 was better than either of the two ways community colleges may now be started under Oregon law and that community colleges would provide education for those whose schooling otherwise might stop at high school.

R. E. Jewell, superintendent of Bend school district No. 1, which operates the Bend college, said that before the school was started only 15 per cent of Bend high school graduates went on to higher education. He said that number was now 48 per cent, and that half of the high school graduates attended college at home.

Dr. Leon Minear, president of the Portland High School Principals Association, and former president of the Stockton Junior College, said the California junior college system operated without friction with the University of California.

Henry F. Hansen, Coos Bay, said that if House bill 594 passed, establishment of a community college in the Coos Bay area was a "virtual certainty."

Stocks Edge Higher After Early Selloff

New York—U.P.—Stocks edged higher today after an early selloff.

Freeport Sulphur soared six points late in the day on news the government will buy large amounts of nickel from the company for stockpiling.

Other metals were irregularly lower with Reynolds off more than two and the weak spot. Industrial issues rose on average thanks to strength in American Telephone and Chrysler, a firmer tone in steels, a better market position for some chemicals, and a rise in some of the miscellaneous issues.

Researcher Attacks Tranquilizing Drugs
Honolulu—U.P.—A researcher said today one of the most widely used tranquilizing drugs appears to impair the functions of the brain.

In a copyrighted article appearing in the Honolulu Advertiser, Dr. Stanley D. Porteus was quoted as saying that use of the drug chlorpromazine may cause a person to lose his capacity to plan, as well as his initiative, his creativeness and his drive.

Porteus is professor emeritus of psychology at the University of Hawaii. He is widely known as an Australian author and a psychologist who in 1955 was named one of the 14 "most important contributors" to clinical psychology by the American Psychological association.

Centennial Money Requested in Bill

Salem—U.P.—Appropriation of \$1.1 million to the Oregon Centennial Commission was called for in a bill introduced in the Oregon House today.

The money would be used to plan and execute celebration of Oregon's 100th anniversary as a state in 1959. Six senators and 28 representatives signed the measure.

Rep. Robert Elstrom, Salem Republican, introduced legislation to broaden the State Highway Commission's authority to erect signs on state highways.

Under the bill, the commission would have power to place signs relating to scenic, historic, resort or recreational areas, tourist facilities or community enterprises.

American Freighter Radios for Help

Tokyo—U.P.—The American freighter Colorado radioed for help today as she fought through heavy seas off the northern Japan island of Hokkaido.

The Coast Guard ordered a patrol ship to go to the aid of the stricken Pacific Transport Line ship.

A message from the Colorado, said the vessel's No. 4 hatch was taking water and the ship was having difficulty navigating the stormy waters 420 miles southeast of Hushiro.

The 7,600 gross ton freighter carried 50 crew members. Her captain is E. H. Bergman. The vessel was en route from Seattle to Yokohama.

Vote Cuts Heart Out of Cowlitz Bill

Olympia—U.P.—The House cut the heart out of the Cowlitz Dam bill last night by one vote.

In a tension-packed meeting, the House voted, 49-48, to amend the Cowlitz measure which would permit the City of Tacoma to continue construction of two dams on the Cowlitz river in Lewis county.

The amendment knocked the props out from under the bill because it removed the emergency clause, which would have made it effective as soon as it had been signed by the governor. The amendment also would require Tacoma to pay for any fish lost because of the dams.

Missiles To Need Half of Budget

Sunnyvale, Calif.—U.P.—The board chairman of Lockheed Aircraft Corp. has predicted the nation's snowballing guided missile program will require about 50 per cent of the total U.S. military budget in 1960—as compared to two per cent in 1952.

Chairman Robert E. Gross, in a letter to stockholders, said the company's missile operations had multiplied its sales by seven times in the past two years, while doubling its operating space and quadrupling its work force.

Lockheed put its missile program under one roof here in 1953 and recently purchased a 3200-acre test site in the Santa Cruz Mountains of California, as well as test bases in New Mexico and Patrick, Fla.

Gross said that most of the company's missile work is strictly top secret. Only two projects—the Air Force X17 and X7 rockets—have been revealed to the public.

He said the "hypersonic" X17 is a three-stage rocket which is four stories high and weighs more than six tons. It is used to simulate long-range ballistic missiles.

The X7 is described as a "cruise missile" used to test powerful ramjet engines and other missile components.

Four Grants Pass city officials met with City Manager Robert Duff and Public Works Director Vern Thorpe in the Medford city hall today to discuss various administrative methods used by the Medford city government.

Main purpose of the meeting was to discuss Medford policies and procedures on street paving, it was reported. Grants Pass officials attending the meeting were City Manager Hugh McKinley, City Engineer Bob Cartenson, and City Councilmen Jack Brownell and Clark Cummings.

Duff returned to his office this morning after attending a legislative committee meeting of the League of Oregon Cities Monday at Salem. About 40 or 50 bills pending in the state legislature which effect Oregon cities were considered by the committee, Duff said.

Martinis With Olives Bring Arrest of Man
