"I just did it as a lark," said Rzonca, who rides his bicycle regularly on the streets of Milwaukee. "Just wanted to see if I was still in shape."
He proved to himself his condition was still good by turning the trip into a sort of marathon. He left Milwaukee on a Tuesday afternoon and arrived at Springfield the following Saturday, completing the trip in less than four days.
"My only real stop along the way was for a few hours sleep at Troy, Ill.," he said. "My other stops were only for food and refreshments, then I'd continue on my way."
Rzonca visited a sister at Springfield for a few days, then made the return trip by train.
"I had good luck on my bicycle trip," Rzonca said. "The weather was good and my bike held up fine all the way."
Rzonca's luck hasn't always been that good. Last winter a Milwaukee judge fined him \$50 for reckless driving after his bicycle hit a wire fence on a city viaduct. Rzonca suffered a broken leg in the accident.

EAST EVANS CREEK-MEADOWS County Road Work Planned

East Evans Creek-Meadows—Members of the county court visited this area last Tuesday on a routine inspection of county roads.

33 Measles Cases Reported Last Week

Thirty-three cases of measles were reported in Medford during the week ending March 8, according to Dr. A. Erin Merkel, public health physician.
Gold Hill, Ashland and Rogue River each reported one case of measles and Sams Valley reported three cases of measles.
Other communicable diseases reported during the week were infectious hepatitis, Medford 2; pneumonia, Ashland 5, Medford 2, Central Point 1 and Talent 1; infectious mononucleosis, Trail 1; strep throat, Medford 1; trench mouth, Ashland 1; and influenza, Medford 4, Phoenix 2 and Ashland 1.

Nine Frostbitten Seamen Rescued From Atlantic

Boston — (U.P.) — A Coast Guard cutter Tuesday night rescued nine frostbitten seamen from a two-day ordeal in a water-logged open boat 175 miles at sea.
The men, crew members of the 151-foot coastal freighter Patricia Sweeney of Yarmouth, N.S., drifted helplessly in near freezing temperatures for 44 hours. Their coal cargo shifted and capsize the vessel during a howling gale Sunday night.
They were unable to give a distress signal and barely had time to scramble into their lifeboat before the ship "went down like a stone."
Lifeboat Partially Filled
Their open lifeboat, though well stocked with supplies, was partially willed with water from rain and sleet storm and heavy seas.
The men, all from Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, were picked up by the Coast Guard cutter Castle Rock just after dusk. The cutter had left its ocean weather station to tow the disabled Boston fishing trawler Jane B. home when it was spotted by the men.

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Cave Junction Police Chief Takes New Job

Cave Junction Don C. Holten, who has been police chief in Cave Junction for more than 2 1/2 years, has accepted a position with the sheriff's department in Siskiyou county. The position left vacant in the police department here will not be filled until the city council makes an appointment. Holten will be deputy sheriff in Siskiyou county, and will be associated with Sheriff A. B. Cottar of Yreka.

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
