

Cards Said League's Most Improved Team

St. Petersburg, Fla.—(U.P.)—Agreeing with those who pick his Cardinals as the most improved in the National League, Manager Freddie Hutchinson pointed to centerfield today and said it "is the only hole on this team."

"Of course," Hutch said, "We could use another 20-game winner on our pitching staff, but I'm not worried about that. Centerfield is the big problem. I have fellows who can do the job in the field, but so far I've seen there's no indication that they will be able to hit as they should."

Bobby Del Greco, obtained from the Pirates, played centerfield most of the time last year but hit only 214.

Hutchinson has two other candidates — rookie Bobby Gene Smith up from Houston where he hit 299 and Chuck Harmon, a 360 hitter with Omaha last year.

Harmon, who didn't make the grade with the Red Legs, will be given "a long, good look," Hutchinson said, adding that "the guy never really has had a chance in the majors because he never got to play full time."

"You can't tell what a player can do until you put him in there every day," Hutchinson added. "I'm not saying I am going to do that with Harmon, but he's got to get a chance to show me he is worth trying out that way."

Hutchinson expressed pleasure at the deal which brought him relief pitcher Hoyt Wilhelm from the Giants.

Help For Bulpen

"Our bullpen was inconsistent last year, but I think Wilhelm will straighten it out along with Jim Davis."

He also hopes that Lynn Lovenguth, who failed to make it with the Phillies but earned another major league shot by winning 24 games with Toronto, would strengthen the relief corps.

Hutchinson praised the work of two rookie hurlers — Tom Cheney, a 19-game winner with Omaha, and Bob Smith, who won eight at San Francisco.

"They both have a good chance to stick on what they have shown me so far," he said.
