Quotes From the News

New York—Sen. William F. Knowland (R-Calif.) stating the United States should not give economic aid to Poland or any other Soviet-occupied nation:

"If the Soviet Union is stripping Poland of agricultural and industrial production, United States aid would be, in effect, indirect assistance to the Soviet Union."

Washington—Ernest Gruening, former governor of Alaska, defending a statehood hearing witness who called Alaskans "second class citizens."

"Uncle Sam is guilty of practicing a certain brand of colonialism against Alaska. That's an ugly word, but it's true."

Tallahassee, Fla.—Rep. John Land urging that the Florida Legislative committee investigating pro and anti-integration organizations be retained:

"John Kasper is not the last of his kind. Other agitators will come in and someone should be here to investigate what or who is behind them."

Khartoum, Sudan — Vice President Richard M. Nixon on Communists who demonstrated in protest of his visit:

"They are entitled to their opinion. I suggest, however, that they print some leaflets and take them to Hungary so the people there can have independence like the Sudan."

Washington—President Eisenhower telling a news conference Congress will have to decide which "basic government" programs should be curtailed, eliminated or slowed in order to trim his budget:

"You can't make great savings unless you are willing to tackle one of those programs . . . Congress will have to say which one they don't want to carry out."

Teamster Money Said Unsolicited

Salem — (U.P.) — Gov. Robert D. Holmes said today he did not solicit money for his campaign from the Teamsters Union.

The governor said he went to the Teamsters building to pick up a campaign contribution and that there never had been any secret of it. "It is a matter of record in the financial statement which was filed by the Holmes for governor committee."

He said George Brown, political director for the AFL-CIO committee on political education told him the Teamsters had a contribution and they would appreciate it if he would go to their headquarters to pick it up. He said he did.

Holmes said he did not talk to Clyde Crosby, Teamster organizer for Oregon.

Crosby testified in Washington that Holmes came to the Teamsters office but he did not talk to him. He said that Holmes met with some other members of the legislative committee and was given a check for \$2000.

Dog Probably Doesn't Know Night from Day

Champaign, Ill. — (U.P.) — If Fido sheds hair on the rugs and furniture, don't be too hard on him. It's because his system probably doesn't know night from day anymore.

That's the advice from Dr. A. G. Schiller at the University of Illinois, who explained that before dogs became house pets they lived only in natural sunlight, and the length of the day affected the thickness of their coats.

Now that many dogs live indoors, Schiller said, electric lights cause the normal mechanism in the animals to get somewhat mixed up, and the dogs may shed hair the year round.

Schrunk Greeted At Portland Airport

Portland — (U.P.) — Mayor Terry Schrunk, "pretty well known" after testifying before the Senate Rackets Committee in Washington, was greeted by an estimated 300 shouting, waving well-wishers when he arrived home by plane last night.

Schrunk planned to rest today but indicated he would be back at his office tomorrow.

Schrunk was accused in testimony before the committee of picking up an envelope containing \$500 to call off a raid on a gambling joint. Schrunk denied the charge.

When asked last night about the refusal of Clifford Bennett to testify whether he paid Schrunk a \$500 bribe, the mayor

said Bennett was scared. "I can't say why," Schrunk said. "The man was frightened to death, I hope to find out."

Schrunk said that possibly one good thing which would come out of the hearings would be some form of protection for witnesses.

He said "some of the senators were pretty much disturbed over the trial by headlines."

The cruiser Canberra will be the official "White House" from the moment Mr. Eisenhower steps aboard it tonight until he steps off in Bermuda next Wednesday.

Only in event of the President's death, removal, resignation or inability to perform his duties would Vice President Nixon take over the reins.
