Chamber, City Representatives Discuss Pending Legislation

Nearly 50 representatives of chambers of commerce and cities in southern Oregon met for an evening-long discussion of legislative proposals here last night.

Forty-eight bills now in the legislature were discussed in an attempt to obtain unanimous agreement. Those attending were unanimous in opposition or support of 22 of the 48 measures.

Attending the meeting were representatives of the Jackson County, Ashland, Klamath Falls and Grants Pass chambers of commerce, and the city of Talent. Invitations to the mayors of all cities in Jackson county had also been sent. Most chamber representatives attending were members either of their groups' board of directors or legislative committees.

Not Binding
Action by the group is in no way binding on the parent chambers, but those attending, felt unanimous agreement, where achieved, would be indicative of the thinking of chamber groups generally. Results of the meeting will be forwarded to legislators from Klamath, Jackson and Josephine counties.

Of the 26 proposals not unanimously agreed upon, some were opposed by one group or another, and in other cases one or more groups abstained from voting, usually because of lack of information.

Here are the measures on which there was unanimity, and the action taken:

House Bills 1 and 361, to repeal the surtax; supported in principle, but the bills opposed on the basis that no tax revenue should be discarded until revenue needs are known; broader tax base recommended.

HBs 8 and 234, to provide payroll withholding of state income taxes in manner similar to federal plan; supported in principle.

Gains, Losses Schedule
HB132, to provide capital gains and losses schedule in state income tax, similar to federal and California plans; supported in principle.

Ashland Residents Approve Two Leases

Ashland — Leases on two portions of Lithia park property were granted to the forest service and the Oregon Shakespeare Festival association at a special election here this week.

A total of 367 votes were cast in favor of the forest service lease. Eighteen no votes were cast. There were 358 yes votes for the Shakespearean Festival lease with 28 no votes.

Preliminary plans for the festival building and expansion program were announced in December and a request made for leasing park property surrounding the present theater.

The forest service request was for leasing land at the corner of Winburn way and Nutley st. for construction of an office and warehouse building for local forest service staff members.

Nutria Purchase Results in Lawsuit

Grants Pass — A \$2,421 lawsuit was filed in Josephine county circuit court this week as the result of alleged failure of a pair of purebred nutria to reproduce.

France L. and Floyd H. Gardner, Grants Pass, claim they purchased the animal from Oregon Purebred Nutria Associates, Inc. of Portland, in September, 1955, and paid \$950 for them. They further state the nutria were warranted to produce a live litter of six to eight nutria within six months, but to date the animals have failed to reproduce despite the fact they were duly mated.

The plaintiffs state that without a guarantee of fitness for breeding purposes, the animals are worth only \$8 each. They are seeking the difference, \$934, plus \$1,200 loss of expected profits and their costs incurred by caring for the nutria for the last year and a half.
