White House Funds Cut 26 Per Cent By Vote in House

Washington — (U.P.) — The House took President Eisenhower at his word yesterday and cut \$4,515,500 from funds he requested to run the White House.

It acted about an hour after the President tossed back to Congress the responsibility of deciding where savings can be made in his \$71.8 billion budget.

Defense Fund Slashed The House lopped the \$4,515,500, a 26 per cent reduction from funds Mr. Eisenhower had earmarked for the White House.

The funds were included in a \$16,021,370 appropriation to operate the White House and several minor agencies during the 12 months starting July 1.

Yreka Man Objects To Oregon Freight Rates

Yreka, Calif. — (U.P.) — A Siskiyou county lumberman has protested to the Public Utilities Commission against an Oregon proposal that would raise intra-state freight rates in California.

BLEW HIS CHANCE San Jose, Calif. — (U.P.) — An overzealous safecracker blasted himself out of business Wednesday when he tackled a bakery safe. Police said the burglar apparently used too much dynamite because the explosion blasted the safe through a wall, shattered windows and shredded currency in the safe.

Policeman's Slayer Transferred to Jail

Eugene — (U.P.) — Albert Wachsmuth, elderly River Road man charged with fatally shooting a state police officer at his home last month, has been transferred to the city jail from a hospital where he had been recovering from a self-inflicted bullet wound.

Wachsmuth is charged with slaying Charles Sanders when officers attempted to rout him from his home where he had barricaded himself after a domestic quarrel.

Another officer was wounded in the shooting fray before Wachsmuth finally inflicted a relatively minor bullet wound on himself.

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
