Earlier, first baseman Bill Skowron fractured his thumb when hit by a ball during an exhibition game and outfielder Elston Howard pulled a thigh muscle. Outfielder Norm Siebern is sidelined with an arm that he strained Friday and that's not uncommon this early in the spring.

Saturday veteran outfielder Hank Bauer pulled a muscle in his back while struggling in his sweat shirt before Saturday's exhibition game with the White Sox and that makes four the hard way.

Game Group Adopts Key Stream Plan

Portland — (U.P.) — The Oregon state game commission Friday approved an experimental key stream plan for stocking with legal-size trout only certain waters in areas where several streams exist.
Under the program, the Hood and Necanicum rivers and 16 streams in the Fort Klamath area will be used for the selective stocking.

Dr. John Raynor, commission fisheries chief, said it was not the desire of the commission to modify the entire trout stocking program, but rather to select ideal situations where the communities involved were not adverse to the plan.

The program also calls for trout originally ticketed for Elk and Sixes rivers to be released in Floras lake near Port Orford.

Study Damage Problem

The commission also agreed to cooperate with the state forestry board in a study of the problem of deer and elk damage on forest lands.
The fisheries section was given a go-ahead on plans to treat the Ana river system with toxaphene, a new chemical fish poisoner which is cheaper than rotenone. The staff also was authorized to study possibility of using the chemical on Davis and Miller lakes.

The commission approved purchase of fishing access areas on Devils lake in north Lincoln county, on Forrest pond in Grant county. The Devils lake access is located near the Highway 101 bridge and has a dredged moorage and unlimited parking.

Mountie Boss Praises Hurler Despite Loss

San Bernardino, Calif. — (U.P.) — The Seattle Rainiers got 10 hits Saturday to down the Vancouver Mounties, 6-2 in an exhibition game.

Starting pitcher Joe Black blanked Vancouver on two hits in the first three innings. Bill Kennedy in a relief stint on the mound retired the Mounties in order in the final innings.

First sacker Bill Glynn slammed out a one-run homer for the winners in the seventh. Jim Dyck on third base for the Rainiers got three for four and outfielder Juan Delis bagged a triple and a single.

Vancouver manager Charlie Mitchell praised the mound performance of veteran George Bamberger in Saturday's loss to Seattle, but expressed concern over the remainder of the Mountie pitching corps.

Anne Quast Fires 75 For Golf Lead

Augusta, Ga. J (U.P.) — Young Anne Quast of Seattle, Wash., battled back with a 75 Saturday to take the three-quarter lead in the Women's Titleholders Golf tournament by one stroke over Mickey Wright of San Diego, Calif.

Miss Quast, a 19-year-old amateur, regained the lead she held after the first round with a 54-hole total of 225 while Miss Wright, a long-hitting professional who led Friday, fell off to a 78 for 226.

Veteran Patty Berg, St. Andrews, Ill., six-time titleholders' champion; Marlene Bauer Hagg, Delray Beach, Fla., and Betty Jameson, San Antonio, Texas, were bunched two strokes off the pace at 227.

3 Rookies Said Heroes at Spring Camp

Three rookies who've never been as high as a Triple-A league stands out today as the heroes of the week-old Grapefruit league season.

One, 25-year-old Dick Stuart of the Pittsburgh Pirates is an outfielder who hit 66 homers for Lincoln, Neb., last season. Another, Jim Landis of the Chicago White Sox batted only .257 at Memphis in 1956. And the third, infielder Andy Rodgers of the New York Giants, hit only .267 for Dallas.

Yet, for at least the first week of the exhibition grind, they outstripped the exploits of Mickey Mantle, Stan Musial, etc., in an effort to rewrite baseball's oldest story: The unknown rookie who makes good.

Stuart, a brash 200-pounder from Culver City, Calif., who announced he is out to top Ted Williams' \$100,000-a-year salary, astonished the experts with his tremendous power as the Pirates won six of their seven games. Stuart blasted three home runs in game-competition and walloped numerous 450-foot drives during batting practice.

Landis, a 22-year-old native of Richmond, Calif., made an early bid for a regular job in the White Sox' outfield with a .400-plus batting average. He turned in his peak performance when he hit two home runs on March 14 to lead the Sox to a 12-2 rout of the Washington Senators.

Rodgers, a 22-year-old Bahamian, smashed three homers and played spectacularly at shortstop

in an all-around performance that had the hard-luck Giants singing "happy days are here again." One of Rodgers' homers was estimated at close to 500 feet and Manager Bill Rigney already is talking of batting the rookie third and shifting Willie Mays to cleanup.

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Red Raider's Norm Oliva OCC All-Star

Portland — Oregon Technical Institute, winner of the 1957 Oregon Collegiate conference basketball championship, placed two members on the official all-star team selected by a vote of the coaches.
Jerry Fasteen, 6-2 forward, and John McCutcheon, 6-3 center, represented the championship club on the first team.
Portland State's Jack Parker was the only unanimous selection. He won the conference scoring championship with 257 points over the 16 game schedule for an average of 16.1 per game. He was a second team selection last year.
Honored as Freshman
Two underclassmen also won spots on the team. Norm Oliva, Southern Oregon College, forward, was honored in his first year of varsity play with the Red Raiders. He is a freshman.
The fifth member is Larry Howard, 3-10 sophomore guard from Eastern Oregon. Howard was runner-up for the scoring title with 254 points.
A second team selection last year won the same honor again this season. He is Bill Hollingsworth, Southern Oregon forward. He is teamed with Truman Williams and Ted Fisher, both of OTI, and two Portland State guards, Jim Perkin and John Winters.

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
