Eugene—High school students have swarmed into Eugene for the state A-1 high school basketball tournament. Approximately 8,000 tourists are staying in Eugene, it was estimated by a staff member of the Eugene Register-Guard. Tournament headquarters reported that 131 high school students were housed by the Eugene Active club in private homes before Thursday.  
Traffic was heavy before and after games. Parking spaces during the games were taken within a five-block radius of McArthur Court.
