Chamber Committee Discusses Pending School Legislation

A discussion of the legislative problems involving education, both in local school districts and in colleges and universities, was conducted yesterday at the weekly meeting of the committee on governmental operations of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce.

Leonard Mayfield, Medford school superintendent, reported on legislative measures affecting schools in which this area has an interest, including the so-called "key district" bill for revising the basic school support fund distribution formula, and the proposal to increase the amount of state participation in school financing from about 25 per cent to about 50 per cent.

The key district bill, worked out over a period of years by a group of "downstate" school officials including Mayfield, has met opposition from areas which would not be favored under its provisions, chiefly Multnomah county and a few eastern Oregon areas, Mayfield said. Attempts to compromise with these groups have failed, and supporters plan to go ahead to see if the original proposal can be passed, the school official stated.

As to the increase in the state's basic school support fund, Mayfield said little or no opposition has developed to an increase of some sort, although it is appearing more and more doubtful that the full amount proposed, \$120 per census child per year compared to \$80 at present, can be obtained.

Some compromise figure may be approved, he said. An increase to \$120 would cost some \$40 million more than at present.

Senate Bill 6, which was introduced to clear up bonding technicalities for the Medford school district, passed both houses recently, but was recalled from the governor's office by the Senate after it developed that it would affect a situation in Yamhill county, Mayfield reported. The bill is now in the process of amendment in the Senate education committee.

Mark Goldy, Medford real estate agent, attended a recent regional meeting of the Voluntary Home Mortgage Credit program in Seattle, Wash.

Ward Smith of Tacoma was elected chairman of the 1957 subcommittee of VHMCP, and Harry G. Baldwin, Seattle, was elected vice chairman.

Goldy said pending housing legislation in Congress was discussed. Representatives attending agreed that unless the pending Veterans Housing bill in Congress was amended to provide a 5 per cent interest rate, competitive with FHA loans, veterans guaranteed loans could attract little, if any private enterprise money, Goldy said.

Jack W. Patee, executive secretary for region XV pointed out that the program had placed 1,367 loans totaling \$12,873,500 in small towns and other areas in Oregon, Washington, northern Idaho and Alaska as of Feb. 28.
