

# Dave Beck To Appear 'Voluntarily' Tuesday

## Macmillan Sees Talks With Ike as Valuable

Prime Minister Reaches Bermuda; Eisenhower Due Elaborate Welcome Ceremony Planned

Tucker's Town, Bermuda — (U.P.) — British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan said today he was sure his top level talks with President Eisenhower here "will be valuable in helping to build up the strong tradition of Anglo-American friendship upon which the whole life of the Free World depends."

Macmillan arrived by plane from London this morning. Mr. Eisenhower was due this afternoon.

**Looks Forward to Meeting** — "I greatly look forward to the opportunity of meeting the President of the United States with whom I have worked and whose friendship I have had for many years," Macmillan said. "We have a great deal to get done in a few days."

Wet, windy weather which had covered this semi-tropical vacation region for the past few days turned clear and fine early this morning, with cloudless skies and balmy temperatures.

The poor weather earlier had threatened to wash out elaborate welcoming ceremonies planned for Macmillan's arrival. It led British Colonial Secretary J. W. Sykes to make alternate plans for receiving Macmillan and Mr. Eisenhower on their arrival here for talks aimed at firming up the strained Anglo-American alliance.

The President was scheduled to arrive in Bermuda waters aboard the USS Canberra, a guided missile ship on which he has been taking a sunshine cruise for his health.

His physician, Maj. Gen. Howard Mc. Snyder, told newsmen aboard the Canberra Tuesday the trip has helped the President throw off many effects of his lingering winter cold but that he still has a cough, although it is diminishing daily.

The meeting, designed to heal the bruises received by the Anglo-American alliance following as a result of the Anglo-French invasion of Egypt last fall, starts Thursday morning at the plush Mi-Ocean club.

**Britain on Initiative** — It is expected to end Saturday evening. An official communique probably will be issued Saturday night or Sunday morning.

There were signs that Britain intends to take the initiative in the talks generally and to mount a diplomatic drive to establish joint Anglo-American long-term policies on all major world issues.

Britain will make a strong bid to align the Eisenhower Doctrine with the Middle East as closely as possible with the Baghdad Pact. Macmillan also will seek to line up the two nations in common policies on the Soviet Union, the United Nations, NATO and Red China.

### Contract Extended With California Consultant Firm

The Medford city council last night extended the contract of Hahn, Wise and Associates, planning consultants of Redwood City, Calif., to one month, which includes services rendered by the planning firm for March.

The Medford planning commission recommended to the council earlier this month the city renew its contract with the firm within the limits of the firm's budget appropriation. One month's service from the planning firm costs about \$324.64, it was reported.

A suggestion of Councilman Stanley Jones that the council receive benefits the city has received from the planning firm before another six-month contract is signed with the firm was approved.

**Motion Approved** — The council approved a motion of Councilman Don Hansen that services of the firm be suspended during April, May and June for budgetary reasons and to permit further council study of the firm's services. The motion stipulated that the planning commission consider the matter before the council takes final action in suspending the firm's services.

City Manager Robert Duff said services of the consulting firm are necessary at this time because of zoning and other problems facing the city as a result of annexations and growth.

Hobart (Art) Pritchard, the firm's consultant, has been meeting with city officials and the planning commission two days a month for the past six months. He also spends one day a month on Medford planning problems while away from Medford.

The planning consultant firm also has been retained by the Jackson county planning commission.

### County Court Says Dead Dogs Buried

The Jackson county court said today that dead dogs left on property about two miles south of Jacksonville had been buried. The carcasses of the dogs had been dumped there several weeks ago, the county court said. It is not known who buried the animals.

The court said previously that dumping of rubbish, animals or anything of that type along any public road is against the law. The violation is punishable by a fine of \$100 and imprisonment of 30 days in the county jail.

Medford city council representing groups of Berrydale residents opposing annexation to Medford "as its boundaries now are proposed." As a result the council will continue its study of the proposal.

A. E. Piazza, Medford attorney, said he represented Berrydale residents in a section bounded by McAndrews rd. on the south, Riverside ave. on the west, Bidle rd. on the east, and Crater Lake highway on the north. The district was excluded from the proposed annexation area revised by the planning commission earlier this month.

**Commission Recommended** — The commission last week recommended that an election be called in the Berrydale area on annexation.

"If the proposed Berrydale area is annexed," Piazza said, residents he represented would be surrounded by incorporated Medford land. This would permit the city of Medford to annex that portion of Berrydale without consent of the area's voters, he said.

Piazza cited a recent decision by the Oregon Supreme Court in the Thurber vs. McMinnville case where it pointed out cities do not have authority to extend their boundaries without consent of the residents being annexed.

Piazza said annexation of the Berrydale area would do "indirectly" what could not have been done if the excluded portion had been left in the annexation proposal. He suggested City Attorney E. R. Bashaw study the legal implications of the proposed annexation.

**Alloted Time** — Since the Berrydale annexation proposal was only considered by the council last night because of the large number of Berrydale residents attending, Mayor John Snider alloted Piazza and two other speakers for and against the proposal five minutes in which to present their cases.

Mayor Snider indicated, because of new information provided by Piazza, the annexation proposal would be referred to the council health committee for further study. The health committee constitutes all members of the council.

James Redden, another attorney, represented several Berrydale residents living on Merriman rd., who oppose annexation. He stated the only reason the proposed annexation area was revised was to eliminate portions of the area which are against annexation so a "yes-vote" would be assured.

**Sanitation Facilities** — He said it would be one or two years before the city could provide wide sanitation facilities for Berrydale and suggested if the area was not annexed "the state could order it cleaned."

City Manager Robert Duff said during the meeting that sanitation facilities probably could be provided in the area in about a year. Nick Gier, chairman of the Berrydale Sanitation committee and a proponent of the annexation proposal, told the council the sanitation situation in Berrydale has been bad for the past eight years. At this point, he said, "what we are fighting is delay."

Gier added that the Berrydale area "has to be cleaned up, and it can only be done through annexation."

### Dinner for Foreign Students Is Today

Twenty-nine University of Oregon foreign students will be guests at a public potluck dinner and meeting at 6:30 p.m. today at the Medford YMCA.

The group was to arrive in Medford about 11 a.m. today through arrangements of the University Foreign Student Friendship foundation, and are to be overnight guests in local homes, according to Bob Jones, executive secretary of the Y.

A panel discussion of their countries' relations with the United States will be held at 7:30 p.m. following the dinner. The students also will talk informally later with those attending.

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### Women's Groups Rally To Support State Institution

Warden's Budget Includes Building

Salem — (U.P.) — Women's organizations rallied to support a \$1 million state women's institution separate from the state prison at a hearing before the House Health and Welfare committee here last night.

Warden Clarence T. Gladden of Oregon state penitentiary said he included \$750,000 in his budget for a women's building on prison grounds for reasons of economy.

#### Could Share Facilities

Gladden pointed out that he felt the women's facility was needed now and that it could share heat, light, power and sewage facilities if it were located near the men's prison.

Claire Argo, executive secretary of the Oregon Prison association, said most women's organizations were willing to build near some state institution to share some facilities but did not want it to be near the men's prison.

Gladden said present women's facilities at the prison were completely inadequate. He said women were forced to sleep four to six to a room in cramped quarters of the second and third floors of the prison administration building.

The women's building contemplated for the prison would house about 65 women while the separate institution advocated by women's groups would house about 100 inmates and also would take women sentenced to more than 90 days in the county jails.

Col. William Ryan, state coordinator of institutions, told the committee that he felt the \$1 million provided for in House bill 507 to build the separate facility was "entirely inadequate."

**Medium Security Institution** — Rep. Grace Peck, Portland, chairman of the committee and sponsor of the women's institution bill, said she envisioned a medium security institution, perhaps of cottage type construction, with emphasis on rehabilitation. She said she felt it might be built for between \$1 million and \$1,500,000.

At present 27 women are housed in the women's section of the state prison. Mrs. Argo said that in 1956 some 64 women were sentenced to three months or more in county jails and that they could be taken care of in the new institution.

### Application for Hearing Approved

A resolution to file an application for a Public Utilities commission hearing to acquire a right-of-way for a railroad crossing at Eighth st. was approved last night by the Medford city council.

The crossing is one phase of the \$1,656,100 arterial street improvement program approved by Medford voters last November. Eventually, Eighth st. will form a one-way couplet with Main st., from a junction in the Hawthorne park area west toward the city limits.

Proceeding through the public utilities commissioner's office is a procedural phase for a grade crossing right of way at Eighth st., according to City Manager Robert Duff.

"If the development of Eighth st. as an arterial street is to be undertaken this year," Duff said, "the necessary legal requirements and acquisition of rights of way must be undertaken within a very short period."

The Eighth st. project has a high priority in the overall 10-year street program, the city manager said.

## Council Authorizes \$9,700 for Part in Federal Aid Program

A resolution that Medford provide \$9,700 to finance the city's participation in a federal aid program for planning municipal improvements was approved last night by the city council.

An application requesting participation in the federal urban renewal program will be filed with the bureau of municipal research at the University of Oregon.

Under the program, which is available to cities with populations less than 25,000, the federal government matches city funds to carry out city improvement planning. One-fourth of the city's participation may be in service, it was explained.

**Total Cost** — Total cost of the planning program would be about \$17,150, about half to be financed by federal funds. City Manager Robert Duff said the \$9,700 is the estimated

city cost for obtaining a land use program, zoning ordinance, housing renumbering program, park and recreation program and services of a full-time technician who would work with the city administration.

The program would have to be completed in one year for the city to be eligible for federal funds, Duff explained.

The program would include a land use survey, which would be recorded on a property lines map. Distribution of population as well as a projection of future population distribution also would be recorded on the map. Field work, printing and similar work also would be needed, city officials said.

**Preparation of Maps** — The zoning ordinance would involve preparation of maps, printing, hearings and meetings. The house renumbering program would necessitate survey and analysis of the existing program and setting up a new system which would facilitate numbering changes, according to Duff.

The program would not involve renumbering of every house in Medford but would provide for house renumbering in areas where confusion exists, Duff said.

### Oregon Given Damp Introduction To Spring

Oregon got a damp introduction to spring today. Winter ended and spring arrived at 1:17 p.m. (PST) and showers were forecast through tomorrow over much of the state.

The weather man said the front of a Pacific storm system was crossing the state today. Rain is expected to become showery tonight with some sunny periods tomorrow.

### Central Point Man Is Arraigned in Court

Barry Eugene Baer, 21, of Central Point, was arraigned in district court this morning on a charge of failure to stop at the scene of an accident involving apparent bodily injury.

Baer was arrested by Central Point police Sunday after the car he was driving allegedly failed to stop at a red light and struck a car driven by Mrs. Ethel Mae Bennett, Selma. Mrs. Bennett's four daughters were injured in the collision, police said.

Baer waived having an attorney and a preliminary hearing. He was bound over to the grand jury. District Court Judge Rawley Moore set bond at \$1,000.

### Hammarskjold Flying To Cairo To Discuss Suez

War-Proof Buffer Zone Possibility

By UNITED PRESS — United Nations Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold was flying today to the Middle East in hopes of ending what he called the long, drawn-out situation of crisis.

He arrives in Cairo Thursday for talks with President Gamal Abdel Nasser on the future of the Suez Canal and the possibility of establishing a war-proof buffer zone between Israel and Egypt.

He may go on to Jerusalem for talks with Premier David Ben-Gurion, but his immediate tasks was talks with Nasser in his move to allay the atmosphere of fear and distrust that has the Middle East close to war.

Through the situation was still tense, recent conciliatory statements by Egypt eased the immediate threat, including one that Egypt would not fire on Israeli ships using the Gulf of Aqaba.

The Israeli-chartered freighter Pandora, formerly the Queen of Sheba, was reported to have left the port of Eilat early today for run through the Gulf of Aqaba en route to Massawa, Eritrea.

It was to pass the crucial Straits of Tiran sometime tonight, but no trouble was expected.

In Suez, the Egyptian Suez Canal Authority announced today the waterway is now open to 2,000-ton ships. It opened it Tuesday to 1,000-ton vessels.

**Basis for Agreement** — UN sources in Cairo predicted Hammarskjold would have difficulty in setting up any buffer zone because of Israeli reluctance to station UNEF troops on its territory. Israel also was said to feel that the UNEF would not be able to stop Arab infiltrators, but could halt Israeli forces bent on revenge.

Ben-Gurion, in statements to villagers in border settlements near the Gaza Strip, told them Tuesday he believed there would not be a recurrence of major Fedayeen attacks such as touched off the Israeli invasion of last October.

### Mayor Is Elected To Festival Post

Mayor John Snider today was elected treasurer of the Pear Blossom Festival committee. The mayor attended a breakfast meeting of the committee this morning at the Holland hotel.

Dorothy Snedden was named assistant treasurer. She is Mayor Snider's secretary.

Route for the April 27 festival parade will be the same as last year, Jay Pierce, committee president, announced. The parade, whose theme is "Nursery Rhymes," will start at 1 p.m. at Ivy st., and continue east on Main st. to Hawthorne park, where three \$50 sweepstake prizes will be awarded winning floats.

Deadline for entering candidates for king or queen of the Pear Blossom Festival is March 24, Pierce said. Candidates must be between 2 and 6 years old. Entrants in the festival parade can be no older than 12. There is no entry fee for the parade.

## Boss of Teamsters To Bring Personal Financial Records

No Advance Look Due for Committee

Washington — (U.P.) — The Senate Rackets Committee today called Teamsters President Dave Beck to testify next Tuesday. Beck had announced he would testify "voluntarily" and bring personal financial records sought by the committee.

The committee had given Beck until noon today to decide whether to submit records of his personal finances. Before the deadline, Beck sent a telegram from Seattle saying he would appear at the committee's convenience and bring the records along.

Committee Chairman John L. McClellan (D-Ark.) sent Beck a reply telling him to appear Tuesday and produce "all your personal financial books and records."

Beck's telegram, addressed to McClellan, had made it plain he did not intend voluntarily to give the investigators a look at his record in advance of his appearance.

**May Duck Questions** — Beck also said that his appearance would be "without prejudice to my rights under the Constitution and Bill of Rights." The Fifth Amendment protecting against self incrimination is a key part of the Bill of Rights.

That seemed to hold the hint that he might refuse to disclose some data on grounds of possible self incrimination.

McClellan's telegram advised Beck that the committee "requires" that he appear next Tuesday. It said he is to produce the records "then and there." "Please confirm by wire promptly that you will comply," McClellan said.

**Puzzled By Telegram** — McClellan said he was puzzled by Beck's language that he would bring the requested records "without prejudice" to his constitutional rights.

The chairman said it wasn't clear to him whether Beck intended to make the records available to the staff or merely have them here physically.

McClellan said he hoped Beck meant he would make them available for checking by the committee and its staff. But the chairman said only Beck could clarify the matter.

Earlier, the committee revealed that West Coast teamsters boss Frank W. Brewster got a \$5,000 year salary from his union's insurance broker and a \$40,000 profit from a racing stable they operated.

## Hearing Thursday On Patrol Budget

Annual budget hearing for the southwest district of the Oregon state department of forestry will be held at 2 p.m. March 21, at the district headquarters on Table Rock rd. north of Medford.

Budgeting for fire protection and suppression of district lands and private lands in Jackson and Josephine counties within the boundaries of the Rogue River and Siskiyou National forests will be discussed at the hearing.

A copy of the proposed budget is available at headquarters. Anyone who wishes to protect the budget has 30 days from the date of hearing to submit a written statement before the board of forestry.

Purpose of the hearing is to give forest land owners subject to forest patrol assessments opportunity to make suggestions and objections, according to the forestry department.

Following the hearing the budget may be revised and will be submitted in June to the board of forestry for final consideration, forestry officials said. At that time the board fixes the forest patrol assessment for the year.

#### Worked for Elkins

Vance, who has a record in Arizona and California, had testified before the Senate Rackets Committee that he worked for Portland racketeer James Elkins at the 3212 club in Portland to see that operator Clifford Bennett did not mishandle club funds. But Bennett's statements notarized and sworn to yesterday said the club's payroll had been "padded" with Vance's name. Vance had told Senate investigators he would tell the truth because he is dying of cancer.

#### Scene of Alleged Bribe

It was the 3212 Denver avenue club at which Mayor Terry Schruk, then sheriff, was alleged to have picked up a \$500 bribe from Bennett. Bennett has sworn he never tried to pay off Schruk. The mayor called the bribe story "fantastic."
