## Operation Designed To Improve Fertility Of Women Succeeding

Washington (U.P.) — A noted gynecologist today reported a growing rate of success with a surgical operation designed to improve fertility of women who are unable to bear children.

Dr. John Rock, director of the Rock Reproductive Study Center at Brookline, Mass., and a professor at Harvard medical school, said the operation has

been perfected to the point where "almost half of the women who undergo it can expect to get pregnant within three years." He said the success rate when the operation was introduced in 1947 was about five per cent.

Rock told a sectional meeting of the American College of Surgeons that the operation is recommended only in cases where diagnosis indicates that infertility is caused by a blockage of the oviducts which carry "egg" cells from the ovaries to

the womb. He said about eight per cent of all infertility cases fall into this category. The surgery, which Rock pioneered, involves the clearing of the ovarian tubes, a relatively simple procedure. Success depends on keeping the tubes from closing again, as a result of adhesions caused by the operation itself.

**Plastic Hood Used**  
Rock said the sharp improvement in the success rate reflects the use of a plastic hood which protects the repaired tube for a period of seven weeks following the initial surgery. This hood is then removed in a second operation.

Three physicians told the surgeons Tuesday that modern surgery can enable some victims of incurable cancer to "live comfortably and actively for a long time." They defined "a long time" as five to 10 years "and even longer in some cases."



### Boys' Allowance Cut In Divorce Action

Chicago — (U.P.) — Superior Court Judge Joseph A. Pope rejected \$20 weekly allowances for two young boys in a divorce action. He said such an allowance would "put a lot of other parents on the spot, and I happen to be

one of them." The mother, Mrs. John Schwartz, 41, said her sons needed a lot of money because they have expensive hobbies. The judge, in his decision Wednesday, set the allowances at \$10 per week for one of the boys and \$12.50 for his older brother.
