

## Nixon's Evidence Shows Nasser To Be Losing Strength

Washington—(U.P.)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon has brought back strong evidence from Africa that Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser's star is waning among Arab leaders, informed sources said today.

However, they said Nasser's influence still remains great with the Arab masses.

**Calls for Contributions**  
Nixon, who returned Thursday from a triumphal 19,000-mile swing across Africa, called on all "interested nations" to provide greater economic and political contributions to bring about a long range peace settlement in the troubled Middle East.

Nixon found wide approval during his 22-day tour of President Eisenhower's Middle East doctrine and its aim of strengthening Middle East nations economically and politically so they will not fall under the domination of either Russia or Egypt.

The vice president, who viewed his trip to eight African nations as laying the groundwork for closer U.S. relations with Africa, gained a first-hand impression of the problems facing the area.

**To Make Recommendations**  
He was said to be dissatisfied with certain U.S. policies and personnel there and will make recommendations which may lead to a diplomatic shakeup.

The vice president discussed the Israeli-Arab issue with leaders in Morocco, the Sudan, Libya, Ethiopia and Tunisia. He said responsible Arab leaders recognize that Israel is here to stay.

He said the problem of Arab leaders was complicated by the insistence of their people that "Israel must go." But he said the leaders realize it is "unreasonable" to think Israel can be wiped out as a political entity. Nasser long has called for the elimination of the Jewish state.

### Boise Man Named as Oregon Conservationist

Portland—(U.P.)—Thomas P. Helseth of Boise has been named as new Oregon conservationist for the Agriculture Department's Soil Conservation Service.

Helseth, formerly of Pendleton, succeeds Harold E. Tower, who was transferred to Washington, D.C. Helseth was area conservationist in Pendleton from 1948 to 1954.

## Klamath Swears in Jury for Trial of Cramer on Murder

Klamath Falls—(U.P.)—A jury of 10 men and two women was finally sworn in here yesterday afternoon to decide the fate of Guy Earl Cramer, 76-year-old pensioner charged with first degree murder in the death of a county welfare commission official.

Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg said the jury would be locked up during the remainder of the trial, the first time such action has been taken here in 17 years.

Final selection of a jury came after a third special panel of 23 veniremen had been called and 92 prospective jurors had been dismissed by opposing attorneys.

**Two Wounded**  
Cramer is charged with killing Klamath County Welfare Commission Chairman Fred Peterson during a welfare hearing in the Klamath County courthouse last June 4. Two other officials were wounded.

The state announced it will present 20 witnesses to support its contention that Cramer committed premeditated murder.

Donald A. W. Piper and Arthur Beedoe, defense attorneys, said they will attempt to prove Cramer not guilty by reason of insanity. They said he claims he was acting under divine guidance at the time of the killing.

Special Prosecutor Charles Raymond of Portland, said he will ask for the death penalty.

## Klamath Indian Bills Discussed

Washington—(U.P.)—The House Indian affairs subcommittee yesterday held a one-day hearing to consider which bill to support for ending federal control over the Klamath Indians of Oregon.

Rep. James A. Haley (D-Fla.), chairman, called the subcommittee into executive session to decide among four proposed bills for introduction in the House.

The Senate already has passed a bill, authored by Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.), which would delay termination until 1961. It also provides that the federal government would pay the tribe \$1.1 million to cover expenses incurred.

Haley's subcommittee has studied two bills by Rep. Edith Green (D-Ore.) and separate proposals by Rep. Al Ullman (D-Ore.) and Rep. A. L. Miller (R-Neb.).

Mr. and Mrs. Wade Crawford testified yesterday in opposition to any bill which would delay the termination date.

## Czechoslovakia Gives Blessing To Marriage

London—(U.P.)—Communist Czechoslovakia gave its blessing today for American Olympic star Harold Connolly to wed pretty Olga Fikotova, 24, the Czech discus champion he met and wooed at the Melbourne Olympics.

## Briefs From the Legislature

Salem—(U.P.)—Portland educators led a fight against the so-called "Key District" plan for dividing up school money. They said it would make long-range planning hard because it was tied in with property valuations which vary from year to year.

Salem—(U.P.)—Two Portland doctors spoke up for a bill which would outlaw use of facilities of the University of Oregon medical school for personal financial gain. Drs. Alice Kulasavage and Gordon B. Leitch spoke before the Senate State and Federal Affairs committee against what they termed taxpayer subsidization of certain doctors.

Salem—(U.P.)—A bill to allow the governor to suspend or replace any officer in the state who is under indictment was returned to the House State and Federal Affairs committee after fault was found with it. Rep. George Layman of Newberg said he believed it was unconstitutional in its present form. Rep. John Mosser of Washington county criticized the bill's invasion of local government.

Salem—(U.P.)—Gov. Robert D. Holmes has signed 11 bills into law, including one to provide for the formation of a public park and recreation district.

Senate bill 115, one of first originating on the Senate side of the legislature, relates to the park and recreation district organization and amends existing laws.

Salem—(U.P.)—Comprehensive licensing and regulating of clinical laboratories and laboratory technicians was provided for in House bill 719 introduced in the Oregon House.

Salem—(U.P.)—The House returned to committee Senate bill 1 locating the boundary between

Washington and Oregon because of possible errors in engineering symbols used in the bill.  
The committee on State and Federal Affairs was expected to act quickly on any necessary changes and return the bill to the House floor.

Salem—(U.P.)—The House passed a bill enabling the gover-

nor to use his discretion in deciding whether or not to remove public officers with judgments against their bonds from office.

Salem—(U.P.)—A bill requiring dog control officers to hold stray dogs five days before killing them has passed the Oregon House and has been sent to the governor.

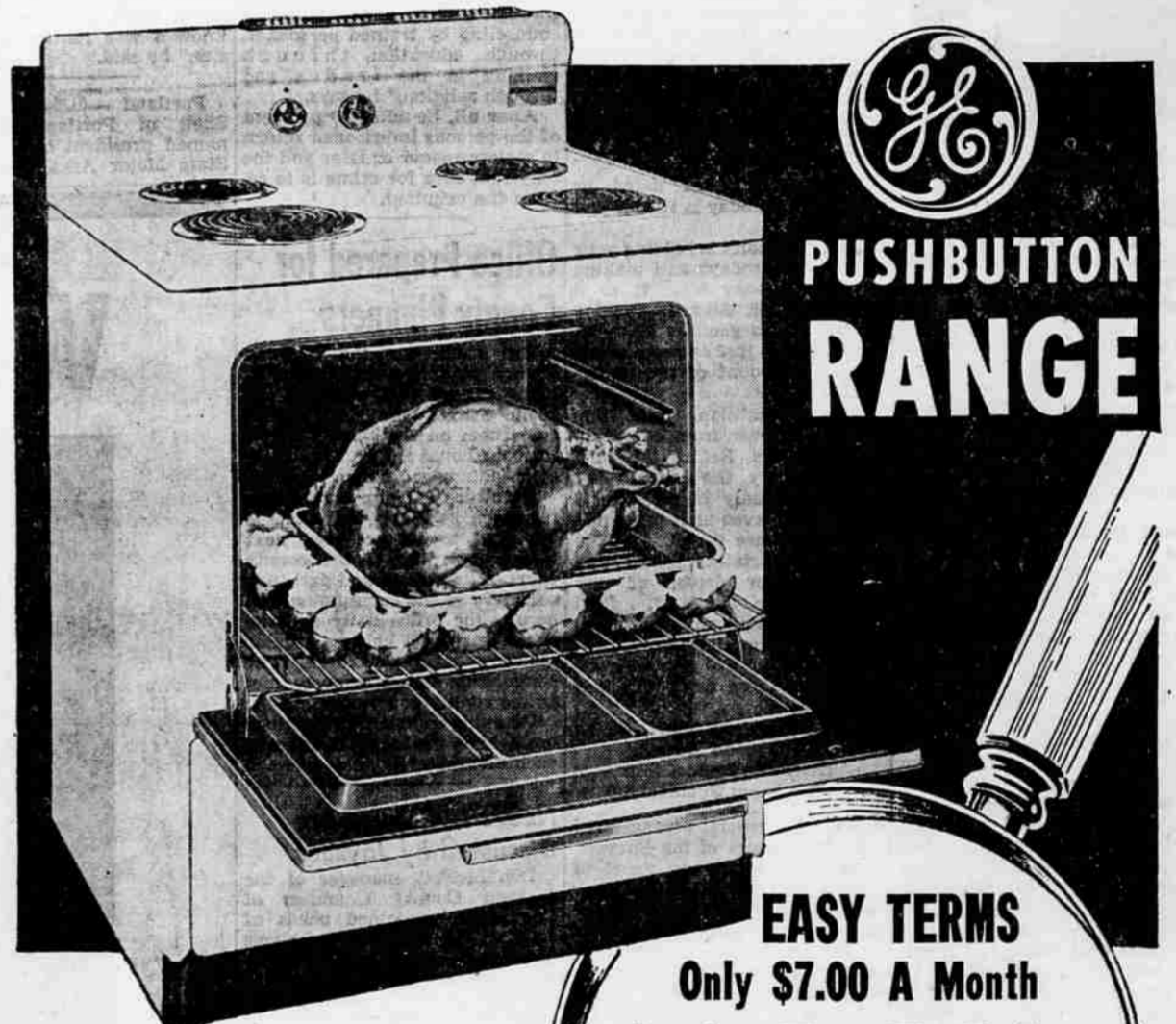
